



From the Pastor's Desk...

To my spiritual family of Our Lady of Peace-

Happy Columbus Day Weekend! As we celebrate Columbus Day this Monday, I want to share with you an article from the Knights of Columbus about this holiday called "Columbus Day- a Unifying Holiday." Obviously with their name, they are making a significant effort to provide true information on Columbus and this holiday as well as their desire to encourage an honest assessment of his impact on our country.

"This is the time to celebrate the making of a new class of American citizens – new immigrants coming in, and the people who have always been here." - Proclamation of the holiday of Columbus Day.

- Christopher Columbus Day is, first and foremost, a day to celebrate the coming together of different worlds; a watershed moment for our planet with new possibilities.
- Its institution was inspired by one of our country's first and most cherished mottos: E pluribus unum. From many, one.

- President Benjamin Harrison instituted the first Columbus Day in 1891 to honor the contributions of immigrant and Native Americans.
- It followed violent attacks against Italian and Native Americans. ONE- the New Orleans Lynching. On March 14, 1891, a mob of some 10,000 people hunted down and murdered 11 Italian Americans in New Orleans – the worst lynching in U.S. history. TWO- the horrific Wounded Knee Massacre. With its horrific massacre of women and children, Wounded Knee (December 29, 1890) is a tragic turning point in the history of Native Americans. It marks the end of Native American resistance and the acceptance of reservation life.
- In many ways, we honor Christopher Columbus as we recognize and celebrate Neil Armstrong – for being among the first persons to undertake a very bold voyage – one that exemplifies the human desire to connect and to explore.
- Recognizing the importance of commemorating Native
 American and Italian communities, Colorado became the
 first state to declare Columbus Day an official holiday in
 1906 with several states following suit. In 1934, October
 12 was established as an annual celebration of Columbus
 by presidential proclamation with Congress declaring the
 second Monday in October an official federal holiday in
 1968.
- This is not the first time we've seen a concerted opposition to Columbus Day. The Ku Klux Klan considered attempts to honor Columbus a threat to their vision of a "white and protestant" America.
- Christopher Columbus is also a symbol for the thousands

- (if not millions) of immigrants, many from Western and Southern Europe, who left their homes in the hopes of finding a better world a country of promise and freedom
- Inspired by this, poor Italian American communities spent years bringing together funds from small donations to eventually build monuments and statues to Columbus that honored their contributions to the fabric of American society.
- Modern-day opponents propagate their own lies. In 1980,
 Dr. Howard Zinn published The People's History of the United States, which presents an inaccurate and distorted depiction of Columbus' voyages and explorations. Sadly, too many people give his work credence and legitimacy.

"No one would dare to say that Christopher Columbus was perfect. But we do have proof that he went to great lengths to treat the locals on this continent fairly (by the standards of his time). Educating Americans on the atrocities committed during the colonial period of the continent is a good thing — an important thing — but doing so does not give us the right to lay the blame of serious ills at the feet of Columbus or erase Columbus Day. The overriding scholastic view of Columbus, including by those who were his contemporaries, is that he sought to treat all people with respect."

Other notes from the pastor...

**Low Gluten Host Procedure We are revising our practice for low gluten hosts at Mass. Those who wish to receive the low gluten host are asked to stop at the sacristy and tell the sacristan (lay volunteer) that you wish to receive a low gluten host. Then please sit in the center left section of the church and go to the presiding priest for Holy Communion. When you get to the front of the line, quietly tell the priest "low gluten host please" and they will give you a pyx. Open the pyx yourself by pushing the small button

on the edge of the pyx. Take the pyx out and consume it and return the pyx to the priest. Then return to your seat as normal. PLEASE NOTE that the low gluten hosts are thinner and whiter than the regular hosts and can blend in with the interior of the pyx (it looks like there is no host in there at first glance). It is easiest to turn the pyx upside down over your hand (after you have opened it) and allow the host to fall into your other hand.

A Family Perspective

Having possessions is an illusion. In today's gospel Jesus told the young man to give up his need to control and put his trust in God. He couldn't let go! In families, our need to control destroys relationships. We can lead, teach and encourage, but we can't control anyone but ourselves.

FEAST OF FAITH Agnus Dei

After the sign of peace, the priest breaks the host into pieces, and prepares the patens or plates of hosts for the assembly. In the early church, "the breaking of the bread" was the name given to the entire Eucharistic liturgy, so central was this action to the meaning of the Christian life. For just as the one bread is broken and given to many people, the many are made one in receiving it.

During this ritual action, we sing an ancient litany, calling on Jesus as the "Lamb of God"—the words used by John the Baptist when he pointed to Jesus walking beside the Jordan River (John 1:29, 36). In calling Jesus "the Lamb of God," John was already pointing to the death that Jesus would die: in giving his life, Jesus would become the Paschal Lamb of the new covenant. During the Mass, when we call on the Lamb of God, we call to mind his self-sacrificing love, his blood poured out for us, and we ask this compassionate Lord for mercy and peace. -Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J. FEAST OF FAITH The Sign of Peace

"Greet one another with a holy kiss," wrote Saint Paul to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 16:20), and he said the same thing to other communities as well. The holy kiss, the sign of peace, has been a hallmark of Christians from the very beginning. In giving and receiving the sign of peace, we are not giving something of our own, but something that Christ has given to us. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you," Jesus told his disciples (John 14:27). Jesus comes to us when we gather together in community. We celebrate the Eucharist not just to receive spiritual nourishment to help us on our solitary way to salvation, but to be transformed into one body, the Body of Christ in the world. As we receive the Eucharist, we are not only united to Christ; we are united to each other. It is never easy to live in community, and we hurt each other on the way. So we need to turn to each other in a sign of reconciliation and forgiveness, to look into each other's eyes, and give and receive the peace that is not ours, but Christ's.


