Family Discussion of the Week: Given the Kingdom To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen. (Revelation 1:5b-6) Adults: In what ways is Jesus the ruler of your life?

Kids: How can you show that you honor Jesus as the king of your life?

CHRIST, THE KING

The selection from the book of Daniel presented in today's first reading was part of an attempt to weave a vision of ultimate success for the Jews under persecution. Exactly whom the author had in mind when he refers to "one like a Son of Man" is hotly disputed by scholars today. The fact is, we simply do not know if the author meant anyone in particular or if this is a collective, figurative image of Israel's triumph. What we do know is that the early Christian community seized upon this passage and recognized it as a messianic prophecy, a foretelling of the ultimate triumph of Jesus as the Christ of God. The Lectionary's juxtaposition of this text with today's Gospel narrative of Jesus before Pilate is a wonderful example of how the liturgy "layers" passages with new meaning by inserting them in a particular context.

The celebration of Christ the King allows us to hear these passages with a new depth of meaning in light of our contemporary understanding of how, in Jesus and his resurrection and ascension, we have seen the fulfillment of Daniel's vision of ultimate deliverance. The veiled admission of Jesus before Pilate that he did indeed have a kingdom "not here" takes on new meaning against the cosmic vision of Daniel, who allows us to glimpse the "Ancient One" on his heavenly throne. 

From the Pastor's Desk...

To my spiritual family of Our Lady of Peace-

A blessed Solemnity of Christ the King! This is the last Sunday of our liturgical year and we always conclude the year by honoring Our Lord Jesus Christ as King of the Universe with full liturgical solemnity (incense and chanting). Beyond the Masses this weekend, we will also have Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament after the 4:30pm Mass this Sunday which will lead to Solemn Evening Prayer and Benediction at 6pm. I hope you can find some way to celebrate this Feast in a special way.

Next weekend starts the season of Advent and a new liturgical year. Bishop Persico in consultation with the Diocesan Office of Worship has decided to resume a practice in the Diocese at Mass that we has not been done since the early 2000s. We will return to the practice of kneeling after the Angus Dei (Lamb of God) until after the faithful receive communion. This will put the practice of the Diocese of Erie in line with most other dioceses in the United States and help to provide consistency of posture throughout the parishes of our own diocese. Here is the background which may assist us in better understanding this change:

• The latest edition (Latin) of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) was issued in 2000 and remains unchanged. The current English translation, including adaptations for the dioceses of the United States of America was published 2002 and was updated in 2010. • In paragraph 42 of the GIRM for the US, we read: "In the Dioceses of the United States of America, they should kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer, except when prevented on occasion by ill health, or for reasons of lack of space, of the large number of people present, or for another reasonable cause. However, those who do not kneel ought to make a profound bow when the Priest genuflects after the Consecration. The faithful kneel after the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) unless the Diocesan Bishop determines otherwise."

• Thus, when the GIRM was first released in English in 2002, Diocesan Bishops in the US were authorized to have their respective dioceses follow some alternative custom.

• In an attempt to express in gesture the unity signified by the Eucharist itself, Bishop Trautman decided in 2003 that the congregation would stand from the Great Amen until the reception of Holy Communion was complete.

Unfortunately, that unity in gesture was never fully realized and is increasingly absent.

Consistent with Bishop Trautman's intention, Bishop Persico also wishes to emphasize the unity that flows from the Eucharist. After nine years of episcopal ministry in the Diocese of Erie, observing parish customs and the practices of people, Bishop Persico has determined now is an appropriate time for all of us to return to the practice that most dioceses in the United States employ. After the Lamb of God, the people will kneel. Once the people return after receiving Holy Communion, they may kneel or be seated. This restored practice is intended to help to unify posture throughout the Diocese of Erie, place us in greater harmony with the Church throughout the United States, lessen confusion, and assist those parishioners who are unable to stand for long periods of time. In situations where the people are unable to kneel, they may sit instead.

This directive goes into effect the First Sunday of Advent, 4:00PM on Saturday, November 27, 2021. I understand the goal of Bishop Trautman in his decision in 2003 but I also see Bishop Persico's point that it was never explained well in many parishes and that it appears to create more confusion and disunity in some cases so the change makes sense to me. Let me know if you have any questions about this.

May God bless our last week of the liturgical year ahead!

**Pope Francis and President Biden Several people have commented to me about their frustration with the lack of clarity about what Pope Francis actually said to President Biden when they met in late October. President Biden has stated that Pope Francis "was happy that I am a good Catholic and I should keep receiving Communion." The Vatican has not responded or made any clarifications to the President's statement citing that the conversations between the Pope and Heads of State are left private. I will offer my thoughts on this in the upcoming weeks and I would also like to have our next forum in our "Church in Dialogue" Series at Our Lady of Peace on this topic in the next several months. As you know, I am a firm believer that we need to find a civil way to discuss these challenging issues and not just ignore them. I am very excited for this plan and hope you can make a concerted effort to be a part of all or some of this special consecration and opportunity to gather as a spiritual family. **Small Group Discussion Meetings for the Parish St. Joseph Consecration will be held Tuesday, November 23rd and Thursday, December 2nd at 6:30PM in the school cafeteria. **Catholic Guidelines on Funerals and Burial As we continue through the month of November, I remind you that our Catholic Tradition encourages us to pray for our beloved dead and visit their places of rest at the cemeteries during this month. Every year I take this opportunity to review a few of the Catholic Church's expectations on funerals and burials that I often see misunderstood or not known.

The first two points have to do with Cremation. ONE- It is permissible for Catholics to be cremated so long as it is not done in rejection of our belief in the resurrection of the body at the second coming of Jesus Christ. TWO- we are expected to bury our deceased loved ones in blessed ground (Catholic cemetery OR a grave in a public cemetery that is blessed at the Committal Service after the Funeral). It is not therefore acceptable to leave cremated remains in an urn in our homes or have them scattered somewhere outside of a cemetery. THREE- please always consult with your pastor or the priest who will be presiding over the Rite of Christian Burial with you BEFORE making any final plans or traveling arrangements. Some days and times may not work for the priest's or church's schedule and it can be difficult if people have already purchased flight tickets, etc (the flexibility of the family is appreciated). Please do not arrange the funeral date and time with the mentality that the funeral home will find me a priest. Fr. Mark and I want to pray with you and appreciate the opportunity to be a part of the conversation to find a time that works for everyone. FOUR- our Rite of Christian Burial includes 3 parts- first, the Vigil Service at the Funeral Home. The church encourages an opportunity for visitation, viewing and prayer at a funeral home or other site. This is because it allows for closure in seeing our loved one

laid out as well as an opportunity for our family and friends to offer their support. To skip this step is to short-change the grieving process and makes it more difficult for our friends and family to reach out to us. The second part of the Rite is the funeral Mass at the Church. There is no greater prayer that we can offer for our loved one than the Catholic Mass and so the best thing we can do for the soul of our loved one who has died (and for all of us who remain) is to celebrate a Funeral Mass. To choose to have a funeral service at the funeral home suggests a lack of understanding and appreciation for the significance of the Mass. Even if someone is not Catholic or has been a way from the church, it could still be appropriate to have a Mass so please investigate this with the priest involved before you make your own assumptions. The third part of the Rite is the Committal Service at the cemetery. This brings prayerful closure and helps us make a connection to their final place of rest. Even if the Committal is done at a later date (the body needed to be cremated or some other reason), it is still appropriate to ask a priest or deacon to lead you in that prayer (and Fr. Mark and I are happy to do that for and with you!).

Lastly, I encourage everyone to make their funeral arrangements NOW with the points above in mind. This helps both the family that remains to not have to worry about the details as they are grieving and it helps the deceased in that they are ensured of getting the funeral they desire.
