The cruel death of Jesus tells us bad things can and do happen to very good people. It also tells us God is present during the suffering. Bad things happen but God does not abandon us

## **Sunday's Readings:**

Gospel at the Procession with Palms - Jesus' entry into Jerusalem (Matthew 21:1-11). First Reading - In spite of my sufferings I am not disgraced. I am not put to shame (Isaiah 50:4-7). Psalm - O my God, why have you cast me off? (Psalm 22)

Second Reading - Christ emptied himself, and God filled this emptiness with exaltation (Philippians 2:6-11).

Gospel - The account of Christ's passion according to Matthew (Matthew 26:14 - 27:66 [27:11-54]).

Family Discussion of the Week: Obedience and Humility Jesus emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death - even death on a cross. (Philippians 2:7-8)

Adults: We are called to die to ourselves in love for others. How do you live that in your own life?

Kids: How do you allow Jesus to live in your heart?

#### **ENCOUNTER WITH THE CROSS**

The journey of Lent brings us to an encounter with the cross. During Lent, we have been led more deeply into questions at the heart of our faith: Who is God? And who are we, the Church? The Gospel of Matthew indicates that, in the crucifixion, God's true nature is most fully revealed in Jesus. In Jesus, God is the selfemptying One, who embraces humility and suffers rejection, as Paul tells the Philippians. God's power is redefined, present not in coercion and violence, but in Jesus' unbounded love. We the Church can learn who we are, the followers of the Crucified One, when we bear crosses that offer life and hope to the world. We more fully become the Church when we empty ourselves by sharing in others' sufferings, rejecting violence, and taking risks for justice and reconciliation. #### From the Pastor's Desk...

A blessed Palm Sunday to you! This is the beginning of Holy Week which is the most unique and important week of our whole liturgical year so I challenge you to enter into the special liturgies and to make this week look different spiritually for you than any other. See below for the full schedule of prayer and liturgy.

I want to take this opportunity to review our parish participation in a new movement in the Catholic Church nationally which has been a true blessing to me. The movement is called Amazing Parish. I reviewed this last June when our Parish Leadership Team (PLT) went to the Amazing Parish Summit in Denver but I want to review and to also give you an update.

I was first approached to consider Amazing Parish back in 2019 by the Faith Formation of the Diocese on behalf of Bishop Persico. I was taking steps to move forward when COVID hit and that set us back 2 years. The Diocese reapproached me in 2022 and everything that AP stood for resonated in me and I knew it was what I and the parish needed, but I still was hesitant because I knew it would take more work. Thankfully the Holy Spirit pushed me past that and last spring, I took the first step of creating a Parish Leadership Team (PLT). This is not the staff or pastoral council, but a small group that helps lead the parish with the pastor in overseeing the spiritual and organizational health of the parish. I identified the following members of our parish for our PLT at OLP- Gina Adams, Warren Beaver, Justin Miles, Mary Beth Whitman, and myself. Then the PLT went to the AP Summit in Denver to be immersed and trained in the culture that AP promotes. Since that Summit last June, I have been meeting weekly with this group and they continue to help me guide our parish. I am extremely grateful to them for their commitment to me and our parish.

To understand more about what the AP principles are, here is a brief summary of its mission: "Amazing Parish exists to revitalize the Church by equipping her pastors and leaders with the training, resources and support they need to create vibrant and thriving parishes. Although every parish is unique, we've found that there are three common "building blocks" that form the foundation of an amazing parish." Those three building blocks are: 1. A Culture of Prayer. 2. A Culture of Healthy Teamwork. 3. A Culture of Active Discipleship. The PLT is now working with the staff, pastoral council and key volunteers to help engage in these building blocks and help create the culture they promote.

This year I plan to more actively share with you details about what these "cultures" look like. As we bring these principles to more of our parish I hope you can be open to what they encourage in us. Amazing Parish is providing me and our parish the formation and vision that seminary training and the diocese have not been able to provide. I am more hopeful about the future of our church now that I have experienced Amazing Parish. It has benefitted me in my spiritual life and challenged me in my ministry. Please pray for this movement in our parish and diocese and pray for our PLT that we can be open to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit in leading our parish community forward into new life and purpose.

May God bless our Holy Week ahead!

\*\*Catholic Services Appeal (CSA) 2023 UPDATE: 420 pledges for \$206,669– that means we have already exceeded our Diocesan assessment of \$137,000 and are \$6,000 from our goal of \$212,000 which will go toward replacing the yellowed and worn plexiglass over the outside of the stain glass windows of the church with new tempered glass. #### \*\*Fast from the Closing Song at Mass during Lent

Recall that during the Lenten Season we also enter a liturgical fast by omitting the Gloria and Alleluia during Mass (two of the most celebratory Mass parts that we sing). To extend that further; and as a way to encourage us to spend more time in silence in the Lenten Season, we will not sing a hymn at the end of the Mass. For the past few weeks we had instrumental music at the end of Mass, and this weekend (Laetare Sunday) we will have a song. Then no music at all at the end of Mass for the next two weekends. As part of that, I ask you to leave the church in silence and wait until you are in the vestibules or outside to have conversations. This also allows those who want to stay in the church for silent prayer to do so. I know that many of you like to stay and socialize after Mass in the pews, so I am asking you to make a little sacrifice and to adjust your process to help us remember that in Lent things are supposed to be different.

You can call or email the office to register. **\*\*HOLY WEEK** This weekend is the beginning of Holy Week with Palm Sunday. Other special opportunities for Holy Week include:

1. Monday, April 3<sup>rd</sup> is the Mass of the Sacred Chrism at St. Peter Cathedral in Erie (at 1pm). There Bishop Persico will bless the holy oils for the entire Diocese for the new year (the Oil of the Catechumenate, the Oil of the Infirmed, and the Sacred Chrism). Also at that Mass the priests of the diocese renew their promises with the Bishop to serve the spiritual needs of our diocese and parishes as ordained clergy. Consider yourself invited- I would love to see you there!

2. Tuesday, April 4<sup>th</sup> to Wednesday, April 5<sup>th</sup>- As we had done for several years, we will have a special 24 hour opportunity for Eucharistic Adoration during Holy Week. It begins on Tuesday, April 4<sup>th</sup> at the end of the 12:10pm Mass and continues in the church until 12pm on Wednesday, April 5<sup>th</sup>. We will need 2 committed adorers for every half hour so please consider signing up for a 30 or 60 minute slot. This is a great opportunity to reflect more deeply on all that the Triduum means to us and to grow in relationship with our God who loves you so much.

3. Wednesday, April 5<sup>th</sup> will include the Jesus Christ Superstar Prayer Experience led by the 8th grade class at OLP School. It will be held at Ipm in the church. We thank our 8th graders in advance for all the time they put into providing this unique meditation on the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus for our school and parish.

4. **The Sacred Triduum at OLP:** These three most holy days of the year for us as Catholics are fast approaching. Starting Holy Thursday Night (April 6<sup>th</sup>) and leading until Easter Sunday (April 9<sup>th</sup>), we walk through the events of Jesus' Passion, Death and Resurrection that CHANGED AND SAVED THE WORLD FOREVER (what we officially call the Paschal Mystery). Please make every effort to prioritize these wonderful celebrations as a way to thank God for our Salvation in Christ and to help us grow in our living them out in our own lives.

**A. Holy Thursday** starts with Morning Prayer at 7am and then we celebrate the Mass of the Last Supper at 7pm followed by prayer at the reposition altar in the cafeteria until 11pm Night Prayer.

**B. Good Friday** (April 7<sup>th</sup>) starts with Morning Prayer at 7am, The Passion of the Lord Service is 1:30pm (with Confessions from 12-1pm and 3-4pm), and a Tenebrae Service at 7pm.

**C. Holy Saturday** (April 8<sup>th</sup>) starts with Morning Prayer at 8am, the Blessing of Easter Foods at 12noon, and the Great Easter Vigil at 8:30pm.

**D. Easter Sunday** (April 9<sup>th</sup>) Masses are 7:30am, 9am and 11am.

## Office for the Protection of Children/Youth

**Child Abuse Prevention Month - Reporting known or suspected child abuse:** It is every adult's moral responsibility to report known or suspected abuse or neglect of a minor to the responsible authorities. Sexual abuse of minors is a pervasive societal problem, and only concerted and sustained efforts by all adults in every segment of society can help to protect children and youth. In the 2021 Pennsylvania statewide report there were 5,036 substantiated reports of child abuse in Pennsylvania. 2,171 or 39.9% of the substantiated reports were for sexual abuse, 1,418 were physical abuse. Parents remain the persons most responsible for abuse of their children. *To report suspected abuse of a minor, call Childline at 1-800-932-0323 (anytime 24/7). In the Diocese of Erie for particular questions on reporting abuse, you may call The Office for the Protection of Children and Youth at 814-824-1195.*

 Holy Week begins today. During this week we will act out parts of Christ's life and share in the mystery of His suffering, death and resurrection. From Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, to the Lord's Supper, washing of feet, going with Jesus to Gethsemane, embracing the Cross (veneration), and his crucifixion. The Triduum (Holy Thursday evening through Holy Saturday) is one day liturgically leading us to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

Lord God, I give you thanks, for you are good, and your mercy is endless.

Here I stand, at the start of this holy week,

the week in which your church remembers Jesus' passion and death, and I am distracted by many things.

Turn my eyes now to the One who comes in your name.

The one who opens the gates of righteousness. The one who answers when we call. I bless you, Lord, for shining your light upon me, and for sending your son to us, in human frailty.

To walk the road we walk.

Open my eyes that I may see him coming, may praise him with a pure heart, may walk in the way of his suffering, and share also in his resurrection.

Today marks the beginning of Holy Week, a week that for Christians looks different than any other week of the year.



## Chrism Mass Monday, April 3, 1: 00pm at St. Peter Cathedral

Today, Bishop Persico will bless the holy oils for the Diocese. The Oil of the Catechumenate will be used in Baptisms of infants and adults to instill wisdom and the strength to avoid evil and to prepare for a life with Christ. The Oil of the Infirmed is used for the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, in which God gives the sick the grace and strength to bear the illness or infirmity. The Sacred Chrism is used for confirmation as well as being part of the Baptismal rite and the Sacrament of Holy Orders. It is a fragrant balsam that represents the "aroma of Christ." It is also a key moment of unity for the Diocese, as the local priests renew their vow of obedience to the Bishop and commitment to serve.

Lord God, six days before his death, your son sat with Lazarus, whom he raised from the dead, and ate dinner with his friends.

Your gospel tells us that Martha served and Mary knelt at Jesus' feet to anoint them with costly perfume. The disciple who was about to betray him said that it was a waste. He didn't care about the poor, reallyand Mary felt ashamed.

Lord, often we cannot discern what is best: When to pour out costly perfume for your sake, even if the world thinks it is a waste. When to be busy serving, or when to rest at your Son's feet and learn. Give us ears to hear you and eyes to see you.

# Holy Thursday, April 6, 7:00pm

Today we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper as we remember the first Mass that Jesus celebrated with the Apostles, when he invited them to take and eat... take and drink; and then commanded them to "do this in memory of me." After washing his disciples feet, Jesus says, "do what I have done for you." He is telling them and us that foot washing is an image of the Church we are called to be - a parish where service is at the heart of what we do, strengthened by the Eucharist.

After Mass, as church we "go to the garden" with Jesus, processing with the Blessed Sacrament to the cafeteria. There the Eucharist is reposed in the tabernacle until 11:00pm when all present will say Night Prayer.

He knelt down on the floor and washed his friends feet.

He was their teacher and their Lord, yet he washed their feet.

Good Friday

Friday, April 7, 1:30pm

Good Friday is the most somber day of the whole year. We are encouraged to make every effort to be prayerful and quiet, especially during the hours of Noon and 3:00pm. This is the only day in the liturgical year where there is no Mass and the tabernacle is empty. We gather for the "Celebration of the Lord's Passion." The scriptures for the liturgy are filled with images of suffering and they point clearly to Jesus. Jesus, the servant who is beaten and disfigured, who empties himself of everything and is led to Pilate is none other than the only Son of God. There are special intercessions and the highlight of the ritual is the Adoration of the Holy Cross. All come forward, to reverence, genuflect or bow before the instrument of our salvation. The service concludes with a simple communion service using hosts consecrated at the Holy Thursday celebration. All leave in solemn silence.

Lord God, we wait, on Friday, for the resurrection of Sunday. And sometimes our lives seem a succession of Fridays and we cannot see what is "Good." Teach us to call your name as Jesus did. Make us trust in you like little children. (ibelieve.com)



## Holy Saturday, April 8, Noon

Lord God, on the Sabbath, Jesus rested. He was in the grave. He had finished his work. To most people's eyes, it looked as if it were all over. He was dead and buried. But only as a seed dies when it is planted in the earth, not to decay, but to spring to new life. Teach us to take refuge in you when we are afraid. Teach us that death is not our end. Teach us to hope always in you and in the resurrection, the making of all things new. (ibelieve.com)

The blessing of the Easter foods dates back to the Middle Ages when milk, eggs, fat, and meat were forbidden during the Lenten fast and abstinence. When the feast of Easter brought the rigorous fast to an end, people showed their joy and gratitude by first taking the food to the church for a blessing. On Holy Saturday morning, families bring symbolic items in their Easter baskets to the church for a special blessing. Traditionally baskets are lined with a white cloth, filled with decorated eggs (Christ's Resurrection), lamb shaped butter (Christ as the Lamb of God), bread (Jesus is the Bread of Life), meats (great joy and abundance), salt, pepper, oil, vinegar (we are "the salt of the earth" and a reminder of the bitter herbs of Passover) and decorated with greens symbolizing spring renewal.





Saturday, April 8, 8:30pm

The Easter Vigil is the high point of the Easter Triduum celebrating the passion and resurrection of Jesus. It begins in the darkness with a service of light. The lighting of the fire and the Easter candle are signs of Christ, "the light of the world," and celebrates the victory of light over darkness.

There are a series of readings recalling God's interventions in history, from creation to the redemption of Israel from Egypt, ending with the story of Jesus' resurrection. The great "allelulia," which had been banished from our prayer since Ash Wednesday, returns proclaiming with joy the triumph of God's Son. Water is blessed in an elaborate ceremony. We invoke the presence of the holy men and women who have gone before us and lead the Elect into the waters of Baptism. Those already baptized Christian will then be received into full communion with the Church. The whole congregation is then sprinkled in the waters of life, recalling our own baptism. The newly baptized then complete their initiation through the sacrament of Confirmation. At the joyful celebration of the Eucharist, some will receive communion for the first time.

Having been immersed in the Lord's passion, in the stories of salvation history, and in the waters of rebirth, we journey now through the fifty days of Easter toward the celebration of Pentecost. We pray that the realities and mysteries of the Triduum will remain with us - commitment, service, victory, resurrection, washing, welcoming - all are part of the Easter experience and the lifelong experience of the Church.
