He had gone "out"—out of the community where his faith had life. Could Thomas be the forerupper of all of us who come in fragile hope and uncertainty to the Christian community, so beautifully described in the reading from the Acts of the Apostles? Serra Prayer for Vocations

From the Pastor's Desk...

"Christ is Risen, Alleluia!". . . "He is Risen Indeed, Alleluia!" A blessed last day of the Easter Octave to you as well as Divine Mercy Sunday! I share with you an excerpt from the Divine Mercy National Shrine (run by the Marians of the Immaculate Conception) on "How the message of The Divine Mercy is Eucharist?" during this time of Eucharistic Revival in the United States.

"The Divine Mercy message is profoundly Eucharistic. This message unveils the inscrutable mystery of God's infinite love and mercy which He pours forth continuously on us through His only Son who offered Himself completely on our behalf. We receive this healing and redeeming gift of God's merciful love when we receive the Lord's Body which He gave up for us on the Cross, and His Blood which He shed for all for the forgiveness of sins.

The Eucharist, the living Body and Blood of the Lord, made present through the Eucharistic Sacrifice, was for St. Faustina her source of holiness, hope and strength. Just as blood carries oxygen and gives life to every cell in our body, the Eucharist is our spiritual food that nourishes and gives life to the soul.

During Eucharistic adoration the Lord gave St. Faustina a special grace to experience the events of the Upper Room on the night before He died. She recounts this experience thus: "During this hour of prayer, Jesus allowed me to enter the Cenacle, and I was a witness to what happened there. However, I was most deeply moved when, before the consecration, Jesus raised His eyes to heaven and entered into a mysterious conversation with His Father. It is only in eternity that we shall understand that moment. His eyes were like two flames; His face was radiant, white as snow; His whole personage full of majesty, His soul full of longing. At the moment of Consecration, love rested satiated - the sacrifice fully consummated. Now only the external ceremony of death will be carried out - external destruction; the essence [of it] is in the Cenacle. Never in my whole life had I understood this mystery so profoundly as during that hour of adoration. Oh, how ardently I desire that the whole world would come to know this unfathomable mystery!" (684).

The Eucharistic Apostles of the Divine Mercy wishing to underscore the closeness that exists between the Divine Mercy message and the Eucharist have placed in their logo the rays of Blood and Water emanating from the Host. The inspiration for this logo came from St. Faustina's vision. She wrote: "That same day, when I was in church waiting for confession, I saw the same rays issuing from the monstrance and spreading throughout the church. This lasted all through the service. After the Benediction, [the rays shone out] to both sides and returned again to the monstrance. Their appearance was bright and transparent like crystal. I asked Jesus that He deign to light the fire of His love in all souls that were cold. Beneath these rays a heart will grow warm even if it were like a block of ice; even if it were hard as a rock, it will crumble into dust" (370)."

We will reinforce this great connection between Divine Mercy and the Eucharist by extending our celebration of Masses this weekend into a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration during the hour of mercy today (3-4pm, Sunday, April 16^{th}).

Other notes from the pastor...

**Easter Thank You's I thank everyone who was involved in our beautiful liturgies for the Sacred Triduum! I am extremely grateful to our parish staff and in particular our director of music and liturgy, Brian Kuzmin, our masters of ceremonies, Matt Sandstrom and Matt Drabant, our lead sacristans, Charlie Rutkowski and Warren Beaver, our lead usher Paul Wickles, Fr. Dave and Deacon John, for all the extra time they put in to help things run smoothly. Also, thank you to our music ministers, lectors, ushers, servers and others who helped with services throughout the Triduum. I am grateful to Chris Ehrman of Allburns and his decorating team, to Sarah Beaver and Teresa Dierkes who helped with the banners, to Rick Lopez who set up the lighting, to Troop 59 who handled the Easter Fire, to Tammie and Deacon John Mang, Michael and Denise Gaines who worked with our candidates for RCIA and RCIC. I also thank those who attended these liturgies and those who came for the first time; I hope you will encourage others next year as well.

****Divine Mercy Devotion** The devotion of Divine Mercy started in the 1930's when Jesus appeared to St. Faustina who was a sister of Mercy in Krakow, Poland. She wrote a voluminous Diary of all the appearances and dialog with Jesus (available from any Catholic publisher) but from that encounter I will summarize the 7 main elements of the devotion that Jesus asked St. Faustina to promote:

<u>ONE-</u> the actual Feast of Divine Mercy, or Divine Mercy Sunday. "On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy."

<u>TWO-</u> the Image of the Divine Mercy. The Lord directed Sr. Faustina to have it made in the image of how he was appearing to her. It was to be signed, "Jesus, I trust You!" and was to be venerated. We have the image of Divine Mercy in our chapel to the right of the tabernacle but it will be in the main sanctuary this weekend for the feast so we can all venerate it.

<u>THREE</u>- the Divine Mercy Novena. Ideally, the novena is to begin on Good Friday and completed the Saturday before Divine Mercy Sunday, though it can be prayed at any time. The novena divides souls into different groups, which are prayed for on a specific day. Categories of souls include souls who are "lukewarm," "priests and religious," "devout and faithful," "sinful," and the "souls of little children."

FOUR- the Hour of Great Mercy, also known as the three o'clock hour. This is the hour that recalls Jesus' death on the cross. Saint Faustina records in her Diary that "It is the hour of great mercy for the whole world. It is Jesus' desire that the moment of His Death on the Cross (3p.m.) be venerated." FIVE- the Chaplet of The Divine Mercy. Prayed on ordinary rosary beads, the Chaplet of The Divine Mercy is an intercessory prayer that extends the offering of the Eucharist. It may be said at any time, but Christ specifically told St. Faustina to recite it during the nine days before Divine Mercy Sunday. It is also appropriate to pray the chaplet during the Hour of Great Mercy. The chaplet is especially recommended to be said for those who are dying. There are pamphlets with instructions on how to pray the chaplet at the doors of the church. SIX- the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Communion through which we meet our Lord Jesus Christ and are enveloped in oceans of His Divine Mercy.

<u>SEVEN</u>- the deeds of mercy in answer to Jesus' call to mercy. In her Diary, entry 742. St. Faustina records Christ's words, "I demand from you deeds of mercy, which are to arise out of love for Me. You are to show mercy to your neighbors always and everywhere. You must not shrink from this or try to excuse or absolve yourself from it." Christ continued, "I am giving you three ways of exercising mercy toward your neighbor: the first by deed, the second - by word, the third - by prayer. In these three degrees is contained the fullness of mercy, and it is an unquestionable proof of love for Me. By this means a soul glorifies and pays reverence to My mercy."

With that in mind, I also remind you of the seven spiritual works of mercy and seven corporal works of mercy:

Corporal Works of Mercy: 1. Feed the hungry; 2. Give drink to the thirsty; 3. Clothe the naked; 4. Shelter the homeless; 5. Comfort the prisoners; 6. Visit the sick; 7. Bury the dead.

Spiritual Works of Mercy: 1. Teach the ignorant; 2. Pray for the living & dead; 3. Correct sinners; 4. Counsel those in doubt; 5. Console the sorrowful; 6. Bear wrongs patiently; 7. Forgive wrongs willingly.

****Catholic Services Appeal (CSA) 2023 UPDATE** Update: 433 pledges for \$214,529. That means we have exceeded our Diocesan assessment of \$137,000 and our parish goal of \$212,000!! This will go toward replacing the yellowed and worn plexiglass over the outside of the stain glass windows of the church with new tempered glass. If you have not yet handed in your CSA pledge, please send, drop off or bring it to Mass in the next few weekends and include it in the offertory. Thank you for your support.

****Parish Survey** Back in October we asked all parishioners to participate in a survey to gain your input on how we are doing at serving the needs of our community and to identify areas for growth and improvement. Included in the bulletin is the executive summary that we received from the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) which helped us with the survey. I would like to share some of my observations about the summary.

- 1. We received 932 valid responses to our survey. 80% were from registered parishioners (746) and according to our latest census, that is approximately 19% of the 4,000 parishioners (members) at Our Lady of Peace.
- 2. Nearly 97% of those surveyed gave the parish an overall positive evaluation with 60% of those rating it as excellent. This is great news and something to be celebrated. The top seven highest ratings included (5) in the area of liturgy as well as leadership and youth ministry. We thank God for the great liturgies we have at OLP and all the ministers and staff who put much time into planning and executing our liturgy as well as the youth ministry program and our staff and volunteers who help to lead the parish.
- 3. Areas of growth identified in the survey are in outreach to the those in the LGBTQ+ community, single parents, those with special needs and young adults. I would like to acknowledge a few things that have been done in these areas since my arrival while still acknowledging these are areas were we need to grow.
 - a. We conducted a "Church in Dialogue" Session regarding Same Sex Attraction and Orientation in 2018. We have not followed up on that in any substantial way, so this survey is a good impetus to another look at that.
 - b. In the area of special needs...
 - We have been the sponsor parish for The Tim Tebow Foundation's "Night to Shine" for the last five years. NTS is a prom night experience for people in the community with special needs.
 - Our Knights of Columbus Council at OLP has provided ongoing support for our local and state Special Olympics for decades.
 - For "The Chosen" Series (Seasons I and 2) we have had a small group for people with special needs.
 - These are all a good start, but we need to consider ways we can build on them.
 - c. In the area of young adults, our coordinator of youth ministry, Sarah Beaver, has organized some ministry and activities for young adults in the last two years but again it is something that still needs more consideration and attention.
 - d. In the area of single parents, there has been no direct ministry at OLP to our single parents. The "Kids Night Out" Program does offer some "babysitting" support to all our families, including our single parents. Previously, we did have a nursery for one Sunday Mass a week to support our parents, but it was discontinued due to

lack of use. We do provide a "Liturgy of the Word for Children" experience at the I I am Mass each week which can support our single parents in their efforts to join us in worship. As in the other areas for growth, these are good to acknowledge while still seeing the need for more.

- 4. The last of the lowest scoring areas in the parish was "spreading the Gospel message to others." I believe the Amazing Parish Movement (see below) that we began participation in back in May 2022 will significantly address and help us in this area. So keep praying for the Holy Spirit to inspire this model of leadership and movement in our parish and be willing to be a part of the solution to this recognized need to improve our efforts to spread the Gospel!
- 5. One goal of our survey was to help identify the needs of our parish and to restart our "Hearts and Hands" Ministry. This is a focused ministry to people in need within our parish community. The Parish Prayer Line and Homebound Communion started as a part of that ministry; but we are looking to add to that and possibly revitalize others ministries that faded over the years. So, look for more updates on this over the next few months as our staff, PLT and Pastoral Council come up with a plan to move forward.

Attention Eucharistic Ministers:

We currently have two parishioners residing at Manchester Commons Senior Living, on West Lake Road, and are in need of a Eucharistic Minister to take Communion to them once a week.

Each one of us can play an important role in strengthening this culture of prevention. For example, we can better prevent abuse by ensuring that the signs of abuse are identified and reported. Noticing these warning signs, taking them seriously, and reporting them could prevent abuse in the future. When we witness inappropriate behavior or something that just doesn't seem quite right, we must report our concerns through the appropriate channels.
