

Family Discussion of the Week: Acceptance of God's Will

Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her. (Luke 1:38)

Kids: Is there something hard you need to do this week? What might make it easier?

GOD'S PROMISE

The lengthy passage from Samuel is a wonderful exposition of God's promise to the house of David: that his throne would forever be gloriously occupied by his descendants. Hidden in the mystery of the prophecy is the promise of the Savior, the Messiah, Son of God and Son of David. The prophet Nathan, speaking in God's name, poetically turns around David's plan to build a house for God, and announces God's plan to build a "house," that is, a dynasty for David. From this house of David will come the Messiah, the Christ, not in kingly splendor as David ruled, but as a humble man, destined to rule forever and over all. When God gives a gift, it's amazing what we are given—so different from what we ever could have imagined.

From the Pastor's Desk...

A blessed Fourth Sunday of Advent! We only have 24 hours of the 4th Week of Advent (really less since we start our Christmas celebrations Sunday evening) so hopefully we are ready. PLEASE NOTE that due to the significance of Christmas Mass and what we celebrate there, the obligation to participate in separate Masses for the 4th Sunday of Advent and Christmas remains. So, the church does ask us this year to attend Mass sometime Saturday evening or Sunday morning for Advent (December 23/24) and then again for Christmas either Sunday night or Monday morning (December 24/25). And yes, I realize that for many people, that means going to Mass for Advent in the morning and Christmas in the evening but when we truly appreciate the mystery of the Mass that we have focused on in a special way this past year, hopefully we realize it is a sacrifice worth making.

I encourage you to get to church early for the 5pm and Midnight Masses on Christmas Eve. The Selah Praise Band will provide prelude music from 4:15-5:00pm and Voice of Peace from 11:30pm—Midnight. This is a great way to prepare for our Christmas Masses and to show thanks to our music groups who put much time into preparing for the Christmas Season which helps make it so special. Besides the music we love to hear, we also look forward to hearing the Announcement of Christmas at Midnight Mass.

Since this is also our Christmas bulletin, I want to wish you a very Merry Christmas from myself, Fr. Dan, Deacon John and the whole staff and Parish Leadership Team here at Our Lady of Peace Parish! We pray that God blesses you and your family in this season of joy as you celebrate the true meaning of Christmas. May the message of the angel 2,000 years ago that "a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord" resonate deeper in your heart so that His grace and peace may grow ever deeper in your soul. Remember that the mystery of Christmas is re-lived at EVERY MASS. The "Word becomes flesh" at every liturgy... that's incredible! - **Holy Hour for Peace We will continue the tradition of ringing in the New Year with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from I I pm-12 Midnight on New Year's Eve (Sunday, December 31st). What a great way to start the new year by receiving the Blessing (Benediction) of Jesus through His Eucharistic Presence right at Midnight! We will pray for peace in our world though a litany of peace. After the Holy Hour there will be time for some refreshments and fellowship in the rectory.

**Genuflecting in Church and During the Creed on Christmas

Another liturgical note to be ready for is the tradition we have genuflecting during the Creed at Christmas Masses when we profess our faith in the great mystery of the Incarnation. I share part of an article from Aletia to reinforce the importance of this gesture. "For Catholics in the Roman Rite of the Church, bending the knee to the ground is a common gesture that is steeped in religious symbolism. It is an ancient custom, one that helps Christians pray with both body and soul. However, it isn't always communicated to the lay faithful when a person should genuflect. Many know why bending the knee is an important gesture, but we don't always know when is the proper time and place.

To discover the answer to that, we need to look at the General Instruction of the Roman Missal(GIRM). First of all, the GIRM states, "A genuflection, made by bending the right knee to the ground, signifies adoration, and therefore it is reserved for the Most Blessed Sacrament." This is extremely important as it explains that the genuflection is a gesture ultimately directed towards God, truly present in the Holy Eucharist. We don't genuflect to people (as some cultures did in the past) or material things, but to God alone. Next the GIRM explains, in most cases "all who pass before the Most Blessed Sacrament genuflect." There are a few exceptions to this rule that are spelled out in the GIRM, but those relate to those who are performing some sort of function at Mass. Outside of those exceptions, it is the general custom in the Roman Rite that you genuflect on one knee whenever you pass before the tabernacle (that contains the Blessed Sacrament). Usually when people enter a Catholic church and walk to their pew they genuflect before sitting down, which is a small gesture of adoration for the One who is present there. However, its important to note that a genuflection is only necessary when passing the tabernacle. This means a person should look out for the tabernacle, as the tabernacle may not be visibly present, in a side chapel, or even empty. There is no reason to genuflect when entering a church if you don't walk by a tabernacle. In those cases a simple bow to the altar is appropriate. On Good Friday, when the Blessed Sacrament has been removed to the altar of repose, we do not genuflect before the empty tabernacle. A good reminder is to look for the lamp which is kept burning near the tabernacle when the Blessed Sacrament is present. Another custom, though not universal in practice, is to genuflect on two knees when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the altar in a gold monstrance for public adoration. This is a tradition many are familiar with, but it is optional. It simply recognizes that Jesus is no longer behind a door, but is before everyone in a more visible way. Besides these instances, there are a few other circumstances when a genuflection is asked for special occasions.

For example, it is customary to genuflect before "the Holy Cross from the solemn adoration during the liturgical celebration on Good Friday until the beginning of the Easter Vigil." During this solemn time of the year the cross receives special attention, and the genuflection gives honor to the sacrifice Jesus made on the cross. Another time is during the recitation of the Creed on the feast of the Annunciation and Christmas at the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man." This is physical gesture is meant to remind the faithful of the reality of the Incarnation and how Jesus descended into the world to become one of us. In the end, genuflection is a beautiful custom preserved by the Roman Rite which gives honor to the true "King of kings" who is truly present in the Most Blessed Sacrament."

**Quotes from the USCCB's Pastoral Letter "The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church" NOV 2021

Paragraph 30 & 31- "Having been sanctified by the gift of the Eucharist and filled with faith, hope, and charity, the faithful are called to respond to this gift. Indeed, it is only natural that we give thanks to the Lord for all that he has given to us. How can I repay the Lord for all the great good done for me? I will raise the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord (Ps 116:12). The word "Eucharist" literally means "thanksgiving." Even our manner of giving thanks comes from God, for we do so by following the command of the Lord: do this in memory of me (Lk 22:19).

The Second Vatican Council taught that, in order to give thanks properly in the celebration of the Mass, we should "take a full, conscious, and active part in the liturgical celebration." We need to be conscious of the gift we have received, a gift that is none other than the Lord himself in his act of self-giving. We become conscious of this gift when we actively engage our minds, hearts, and bodies to every part of the liturgy, allowing God through the words, actions, gestures, and even the moments of silence to speak to us. We actively and consciously participate by giving our full attention to the words being spoken in the prayers and the Scriptures, even if we have heard them hundreds of times before. We do so also by listening to the homily and reflecting upon how the Lord may be speaking to us through his ordained minister. We are actively giving thanks when we join in singing and in the responses; when we kneel, stand, and sit; and when we pay attention to the liturgical seasons where the entire history of what God has done for us, in and through his Son, is revealed to us."

Confession (also known as Reconciliation or Penance) is a sacrament instituted by Jesus Christ in His love and mercy to offer sinners forgiveness for offenses committed against God. Not only does it free us from our sins, it challenges us to have the same compassion and forgiveness for those who sin against us.

Why should you go?

- It cleanses your Soul. There is no better feeling than realizing that God has heard you and forgiven you. It strengthens you for the journey still ahead.
- It allows your relationship with God to grow and strengthen. The more we receive this sacrament and work to avoid sin, the more we learn to rely on His guidance and become more open to His will for us. Confession gives us sacramental grace to grow in holiness as we recognize our mistakes and work to repair our relationship with God.
- Through it we experience Divine forgiveness. There is no question of "if" we are forgiven. If you confess all your mortal sins and are truly sorry for them, your soul *is* cleansed when the priest recites the words of absolution.
- It allows you to relinquish your guilt. Living a life full of unforgiven sins not only separates us from God, it weighs on our hearts, causing us to feel shame and guilt.
- It allows you to take off the "rose colored glasses." Acknowledging your sins is the first step in being accountable to yourself and healing and renewing your relationship with God. Only when we are honest with ourselves and God can we grow in holiness and to live in His light.

Marriage



Why get married in a church? Engaged couples are looking for a location that will easily accommodate both the ceremony and the reception. Because most church weddings don't meet that level of easy convenience or modern backdrop, many couples question the idea of a church wedding.

If you are preparing for marriage, the real reason for a "church wedding" is to celebrate the solemn Sacrament. Marriage is a Sacrament, and thus the Catholic Church requests that it be celebrated in a sacred place, a church. For this reason we celebrate weddings in the same building we celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Communion and Reconciliation.

Marriage is more than just a contractual agreement between two parties, it is a living embodiment of Christ's relationship to his Church. The Catechism of the Catholic Church 1603 says "...God himself is the author of marriage. The vocation to marriage is written in the very nature of man and woman as they came from the hand of the Creator. Marriage is not a purely human institution despite the many variations it may have undergone through the centuries in different cultures, social structures, and spiritual attitudes. These differences should not cause us to forget its common and permanent characteristics. Although the dignity of this institution is not transparent everywhere with the same clarity, some sense of the greatness of the matrimonial union exists in all cultures."

The way you begin your marriage-in that sacred space-creates an anchor in your life together. The vows, readings, songs will live on in memories, but the church is a place you can always return to for encouragement and renewal.

Are you ready to plan your wedding at Our Lady of Peace? We recommend you reach out to the Pastor or Priest who will preside at your ceremony at least 6 months and preferably 12 months prior to your wedding. Divorce is a reality for all people, even for Roman Catholics. There are many myths about Marriage Annulments in the Catholic Church.

Myth #1 - A divorced person is automatically excommunicated from the Catholic Church. The truth is that divorce, itself, does not alter a person's status in the Catholic Church. Divorce is a function of civil law and secular courts.

Myth #2 Only Catholic Marriages need to be annulled. The truth is that every marriage is considered a promise for life until death. It makes no difference whether that promise was made in a Catholic ceremony or not.

Myth #3 - If children were born in the marriage, it can't be annulled. The truth is that the Catholic Church considers the openness to children to be a natural part of sacramental marriage. Whether children were born or not has no bearing on the possibility of annulment. The church never considers the children of a divorced and/or annulled marriage illegitimate. Children are always a beautiful and precious gift of God no matter the circumstances they are brought into this world.

Myth #4 - The ex-spouse has to agree to an annulment or it can't be granted. The truth is that both spouses have equal rights in an annulment proceeding, but the ex-spouse and the person who starts the annulment process do not have to agree. The Tribunal judges can grant an annulment even if the exspouse is adamantly opposed to an annulment.

Myth #5 - An Annulment is just a "Catholic Divorce." A civil divorce and a church annulment are vastly different things. A divorce is concerned with the legal realities of marriage only, while an annulment is concerned with the religious and spiritual sacrament of marriage. An annulment looks at the marriage from everything leading up to and at the time of consent (the "I do"). Just because there is infidelity or any other issues that happen after the time of consent does not automatically mean that an annulment will be granted.

Myth #6 - An Annulment means the marriage never took place. An annulment can't erase history and does not try to. An annulment states that valid consent was never present in the marriage, not that the marriage never took place. The purpose of an annulment is to bring healing and peace between the parties of the marriage so that they can fully participate in the life of God's grace and the life of the Church and if they are called to marry again to be open and ready to receive the gift of a valid, sacramental marriage.

Information on the annulment process is provided by The Office of the Marriage Tribunal, Diocese of Erie and can be found at www.eriercd.org/tribunal.html. Each marriage is reviewed by the Tribunal as required by Canon law, and is kept confidential.
