From the Pastor's Desk...

A blessed Palm Sunday to you! We enter the holiest week of the liturgical year and I hope this week will look different for you than any other week in your year. I continue here in my bulletin article to explain the Sacred Triduum in more detail than I have in the past as I and our parish leadership want to stress the importance of the Triduum and encourage you more than ever to attend its liturgies. So this weekend I conclude the explanation of the Triduum with the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday. Over the last two weeks I focused on Holy Thursday and then Good Friday/ Holy Saturday. If you missed either, you can find them on our website.

EASTER VIGIL (March 30th)- A vigil Mass is held after nightfall on Holy Saturday, or before dawn on Easter Sunday, in celebration of the resurrection of Jesus. This is called the Easter Vigil: the most glorious, beautiful, and dramatic liturgy for the Church. At Our Lady of Peace our Vigil Mass is at 8:30pm.

The vigil is divided into four parts and can last up to three hours: 1) the Service of Light, 2) the Liturgy of the Word, 3) the Liturgy of Baptism, and 4) the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This is also the Mass in which RCIA catechumens are brought into full communion with the Catholic Church. Although celebrated Holy Saturday evening, it is the dramatic Easter vigil liturgy that marks the beginning of Easter. We are awaiting our master's return with our lamps full and burning, so that he will find us awake and seat us at his table (cf. Luke 12:35ff).

The Service of Light and the Liturgy of the Word are most unique to the Vigil.

I) Service of Light - The atmosphere in the church is different: the holy water fonts are drained, all the lights are out, the tabernacle is empty. The service begins outside the church. A new fire is lit and blessed.

After the blessing of the new fire, one of the ministers brings the paschal candle to the priest, who cuts a cross into the candle with a stylus. Then he makes the Greek letter Alpha above the cross, the letter Omega below, and the four numerals of the current year between the arms of the cross, saying meanwhile:

Christ yesterday and today (he cuts a vertical line);

the Beginning and the End (he cuts a horizontal line);

the Alpha (he cuts the letter Alpha above the vertical line); and the Omega (he cuts the letter Omega below the vertical line);

All time belongs to him (he cuts the 1st numeral of the current year in the upper left corner of the cross);

and all the ages (he cuts the 2nd numeral of the current year in the upper right corner of the cross);

To him be glory and power (he cuts the 3rd numeral of the current year in the lower left corner of the cross);

through every age and for ever. Amen (4th numeral of the current year in the lower right corner of the cross).

Then the priest may insert five grains of incense into the candle in the form of a cross, meanwhile saying:

I. By his holy; 2. and glorious wounds; 3. may Christ the Lord; 4. guard us; 5. and protect us. Amen.

The priest lights the candle from the new fire. The candle is then processed through the church, with the deacon lifting the candle at three different times, singing: The Light of Christ. (or Lumen Christi) and the congregation sings in reply:

Thanks be to God (or Deo gratias). Everyone lights their candle from the Easter candle and continue in procession until the whole church is alight. The Paschal candle symbolizes Christ, the Light of the World.

Next follows the glorious Easter song of the Catholic Church: the Exsultet (the Easter Proclamation) which can be found on page 118 of the Breaking Bread Hymnal. "This magnificent hymn, which is remarkable for its lyric beauty and profound symbolism, announces the dignity and meaning of the mystery of Easter; it tells of man's sin, of God's mercy, and of the great love of the Redeemer for mankind, admonishing us in turn to thank the Trinity for all the graces that have been lavished upon us" (©1947 With Christ Through the Year, by Bernard Strasser). This is usually sung by the deacon.

2) Liturgy of the Word - During the Easter vigil, nine readings are provided: seven Old Testament and two New Testament. Not all are required to be read due to time constraints, but at least three Old Testament readings must be read, including Exodus 14. These readings help us meditate on the wonderful works of God for his people since the beginning of time. The readings are:

> Creation, Gen 1:1-2; 2; Abraham and Isaac, Gen 22:1-18; Crossing of the Red Sea, Exodus 14:15–15:1; Isaiah 54:5-14; Isaiah 55:1-11; Baruch 3:9-15.32–4:4; Ezekiel 36:16-17.18-28; Romans 6:3-11; and

Gospel Reading, Year A: Matthew 28:1-10; Year B: Mark 16:1-7; Year C: Luke 24:1-12. The Claric is away before the reading of the Enistle of the

The Gloria is sung before the reading of the Epistle of the Romans, and the Alleluia is sung before the Gospel.

EASTER SUNDAY (March 31st)- Easter Sunday is what we've all been waiting for! The forty days of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent was in preparation for this day, when our hearts and souls can drink in deeply the culmination of the Paschal mystery: the Resurrection.

"Therefore Easter is not simply one feast among others, but the 'Feast of feasts', the 'Solemnity of solemnities', just as the Eucharist is the 'Sacrament of sacraments'. St. Athanasius calls Easter 'the Great Sunday' and the Eastern Churches call Holy Week 'the Great Week'. The mystery of the Resurrection, in which Christ crushed death, permeates with its powerful energy our old time, until all is subjected to him." —The Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1168 and 1169

I hope and pray that our parish family may enter into Holy Week more deeply than we ever have before... and may God bless our Holy Week ahead!

****Masses this Week** Monday, Mar. 25th through Wednesday, March 27th- Masses of Holy Week; Thursday, March 28th- Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper; Friday, Mar. 29th- Friday of the Passion of the Lord (Not Mass); Saturday, Mar. 30th- Easter Vigil. ****The Annunciation of the Lord is transferred this year to Monday, April 8th since it falls during Holy Week (March 25th).** Holy Week and the Easter Octave take liturgical precedence over this Solemnity so April 8th is the first available day after those special weeks.

**Quotes from the USCCB's Pastoral Letter "The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church" NOV 2021

<u>Paragraph 56:</u> "SENT FORTH 56. Pope Benedict XVI reminded us that the "love that we celebrate in the sacrament is not something we can keep to ourselves. By its very nature it demands to be shared with all."80 We are not the only ones in need of the love that Christ has shown us. We are called to help the rest of the world experience it. "What the world needs is God's love; it needs to encounter Christ and to believe in him. The Eucharist is thus the source and summit not only of the Church's life, but also of her mission."81 Jesus is sent by the Father for the salvation of the world. At the very end of the celebration of the Eucharist, we who have received the Body and Blood of Christ and have been incorporated more profoundly into his Mystical Body are likewise sent out to proclaim the Good News for the salvation of the world: "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life.""

A Family Perspective

The Passion of Jesus makes it clear, no one escapes suffering. Suffering is inevitable but no one should suffer alone. That is one of the primary roles of families, to stand with and support each other in suffering.



Holy Week begins today. During this week we will act out parts of Christ's life and share in the mystery of His suffering, death and resurrection. From Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, to the Lord's Supper, washing of feet, going with Jesus to Gethsemane, embracing the Cross (veneration), and his crucifixion. The Triduum (Holy Thursday evening through Holy Saturday) is one day liturgically leading us to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

Lord God, I give you thanks, for you are good, and your mercy is endless. Here I stand, at the start of this holy week.

the week in which your church remembers Jesus' passion and death, and I am distracted by many things.

Turn my eyes now to the One who comes in your name.

The one who opens the gates of righteousness. The one who answers when we call. I bless you, Lord, for shining your light upon me, and for sending your son to us, in human frailty.

To walk the road we walk.

Today, we join those who honored Jesus during his triumphant entry into Jerusalem. We take palms as a symbol of the ways that we can honor and adore Jesus more in our lives and to reaffirm our desire to welcome Him and never take Him for granted.

Today marks the beginning of Holy Week, a week that for Christians looks different than any other week of the year.



Chrism March 25, 1: 00pm at St. Peter Cathedral

Today, Bishop Persico will bless the holy oils for the Diocese. The Oil of the Catechumenate will be used in Baptisms of infants and adults to instill wisdom and the strength to avoid evil and to prepare for a life with Christ. The Oil of the Infirmed is used for the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, in which God gives the sick the grace and strength to bear the illness or infirmity. The Sacred Chrism is used for confirmation as well as being part of the Baptismal rite and the Sacrament of Holy Orders. It is a fragrant balsam that represents the "aroma of Christ." It is also a key moment of unity for the Diocese, as the local priests renew their vow of obedience to the Bishop and commitment to serve.

Lord God, six days before his death, your son sat with Lazarus, whom he raised from the dead, and ate dinner with his friends.

Your gospel tells us that Martha served and Mary knelt at Jesus' feet to anoint them with costly perfume. The disciple who was about to betray him said that it was a waste. He didn't care about the poor, reallyand Mary felt ashamed.

Lord, often we cannot discern what is best: When to pour out costly perfume for your sake, even if the world thinks it is a waste. When to be busy serving, or when to rest at your Son's feet and learn. Give us ears to hear you and eyes to see you.

Today we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper as we remember the first Mass that Jesus celebrated with the Apostles, when he invited them to take and eat... take and drink; and then commanded them to "do this in memory of me." After washing his disciples feet, Jesus says, "do what I have done for you." He is telling them and us that foot washing is an image of the Church we are called to be - a parish where service is at the heart of what we do, strengthened by the Eucharist.

After Mass, as church we "go to the garden" with Jesus, processing with the Blessed Sacrament to the cafeteria. There the Eucharist is reposed in the tabernacle until 11:00pm when all present will say Night Prayer.

Lord God, You sent your Son into the world, and before his hour had come, he washed his disciples' feet. You had given all things into his hands.

He had come for you, and was going to you, and what did he do?

He knelt down on the floor and washed his friends feet.

He was their teacher and their Lord, yet he washed their feet.

Lord God, help us learn from his example; Help us to do as he has done for us.

Friday, March 29, 1:30pm

Good Friday is the most somber day of the whole year. We are encouraged to make every effort to be prayerful and quiet, especially during the hours of Noon and 3:00pm. This is the only day in the liturgical year where there is no Mass and the tabernacle is empty. We gather for the "Celebration of the Lord's Passion." The scriptures for the liturgy are filled with images of suffering and they point clearly to Jesus. Jesus, the servant who is beaten and disfigured, who empties himself of everything and is led to Pilate is none other than the only Son of God. There are special intercessions and the highlight of the ritual is the Adoration of the Holy Cross. All come forward, to reverence, genuflect or bow before the instrument of our salvation. The service concludes with a simple communion service using hosts consecrated at the Holy Thursday celebration. All leave in solemn silence.

Lord God, we wait, on Friday, for the resurrection of Sunday.

And sometimes our lives seem a succession of Fridays and we cannot see what is "Good." Teach us to call your name as Jesus did. Make us trust in you like little children. (ibelieve.com)



Holy Saturday, March 30, Noon

Lord God, on the Sabbath, Jesus rested. He was in the grave. He had finished his work. To most people's eyes, it looked as if it were all over. He was dead and buried. But only as a seed dies when it is planted in the earth, not to decay, but to spring to new life. Teach us to take refuge in you when we are afraid. Teach us that death is not our end. Teach us to hope always in you and in the resurrection, the making of all things new. (ibelieve.com)

The blessing of the Easter foods dates back to the Middle Ages when milk, eggs, fat, and meat were forbidden during the Lenten fast and abstinence. When the feast of Easter brought the rigorous fast to an end, people showed their joy and gratitude by first taking the food to the church for a blessing. On Holy Saturday morning, families bring symbolic items in their Easter baskets to the church for a special blessing. Traditionally baskets are lined with a white cloth, filled with decorated eggs (Christ's Resurrection), lamb shaped butter (Christ as the Lamb of God), bread (Jesus is the Bread of Life), meats (great joy and abundance), salt, pepper, oil, vinegar (we are "the salt of the earth" and a reminder of the bitter herbs of Passover) and decorated with greens symbolizing spring renewal.



Rise

J Saturday, March 30, 8:30pm

The Easter Vigil is the high point of the Easter Triduum celebrating the passion and resurrection of Jesus. It begins in the darkness with a service of light. The lighting of the fire and the Easter candle are signs of Christ, "the light of the world," and celebrates the victory of light over darkness.

There are a series of readings recalling God's interventions in history, from creation to the redemption of Israel from Egypt, ending with the story of Jesus' resurrection. The great "allelulia," which had been banished from our prayer since Ash Wednesday, returns proclaiming with joy the triumph of God's Son. Water is blessed in an elaborate ceremony. We invoke the presence of the holy men and women who have gone before us and lead the Elect into the waters of Baptism. Those already baptized Christian will then be received into full communion with the Church. The whole congregation is then sprinkled in the waters of life, recalling our own baptism. The newly baptized then complete their initiation through the sacrament of Confirmation. At the joyful celebration of the Eucharist, some will receive communion for the first time.

Having been immersed in the Lord's passion, in the stories of salvation history, and in the waters of rebirth, we journey now through the fifty days of Easter toward the celebration of Pentecost. We pray that the realities and mysteries of the Triduum will remain with us - commitment, service, victory, resurrection, washing, welcoming - all are part of the Easter experience and the lifelong experience of the Church.
