

Family Discussion of the Week: Setting Priorities

Listen! The wages of the laborers who mowed your fields, which you kept back by fraud, cry out, and the cries of the harvesters have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts. (James 5:4) *Adults:* What are the three most important values motivating your daily decision? *Kids:* Could a poor person who is wise be richer in a way than a foolish person who has many things? Why?

NOT AGAINST US

Like Moses before him, Jesus corrects his disciples' misunderstanding of the gift of the Spirit. They saw people who were not of their company casting out demons and doing other works such as Jesus had done. Jesus points out that no one who does a good deed in his name can be opposed to him at the same time. He goes on to point out the importance of the "little ones,": the poor, simple people, children, the meek ones who are not important in the world. It is to them that he was sent, not to the wealthy and the self-righteous. He underscores the importance of small works done in faith, as well as big works like driving out demons. "Anyone who gives you a cup of water . . . because you belong to Christ . . . will surely not lose his reward" (Mark 9:41). God builds the coming reign little by little in our actions, however small and unassuming, when they are done out of love of God and neighbor.

Serra Prayer for Vocations

From the Pastor's Desk...

Happy 69th Anniversary Our Lady of Peace Parish! I share with you an excerpt from our parish history as we approach our anniversary on September 30th... "In September 1955, Archbishop John Mark Gannon had purchased a tract of land on the south side of West 38th Street in Millcreek Township. Always the visionary, Archbishop Gannon created Our Lady of Peace Parish anticipating the spiritual needs of people who would be moving into the area. On September 23rd, he issued a decree establishing the parish on September 30th. Father Daily was appointed the founding pastor effective October 1st. His mission: establish both the physical and spiritual makings of a parish.

Plans unfolded quickly. On the first Friday of October, James Wilson, superintendent of Millcreek Schools, assured Father Daily that the Millcreek School Board would grant permission for the use of McDowell High School Auditorium for Sunday Masses. With a major hurdle crossed, the fledgling parish celebrated its first Masses on October 17th. About 150 faithful attended either the 9 or 11 AM. Masses. The total Sunday collection was \$95.77, the only funds available for the parish. Each passing Sunday brought more people. Two more Masses - 8 AM. and Noon - were added in November. On the third Sunday of May 1956, a 10 AM. Mass was added. Father Gilio Dipre, a professor at Gannon College, became the first weekend assistant at Our Lady of Peace.

The unfinished house on the new parish property became the rectory on November 1,1955. From there, Father Daily began the framework that would support necessary parish activities. The Holy Name and Rosary Altar Societies were organized first. On a November afternoon following Sunday Masses, Holy Name men set out through the area to take a quick census. Meanwhile, the ladies of the Rosary Altar Society organized a card party. Members of each society were just getting to know each other. Committee "heads" were neither elected nor appointed; they simply volunteered their services. The ladies chose the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1955, to dedicate our first parish social function to our Patroness - a card party at Cathedral Preparatory School. More than 1,000 attended an enjoyable afternoon during which a raffle earned \$2,500, welcome funds to lay the parish financial foundation.

Soon, architects were hired and sketches of a proposed school and church were drawn. Meetings were conducted in the unfinished rectory basement. Little by little, the various activities of parish life took root. A baptismal font was purchased and set up in the rectory basement. Sixty-seven new Catholic souls were baptized. Confessions were heard each Saturday in a confessional set up in the fruit cellar. The basement was home to convert and catechism classes and study clubs. On August 23, 1956, the rectory became Father Daily's home and soon after the "historic" basement was converted into a chapel where the Blessed Sacrament was reserved. Weekday Masses also were offered there. Just a few days earlier on August 19th, Archbishop Gannon broke ground for the new school and construction began the next day. Although work was slowed by a long, severe winter, the archbishop laid the cornerstone for the school in June 1957 and presided at a Benediction service in the unfinished lobby of the new building. On September 8th of that year, the first Sunday Masses were offered in "our own" building, using the cafeteria of the new school as a church. That Sunday, 1,576 people attended Masses, a figure about 10 times higher than the group that attended the first Masses under the Our Lady of Peace banner only two years earlier."

We thank God for the faith, dedication and hard work of Fr. Daily and all those who were part of establishing the foundation of our parish. May their commitment and sacrifice inspire us to follow in their footsteps of continuing the mission of Christ right here at Our Lady of Peace!

May God bless OLP parish on our anniversary and our week ahead!

Other notes from the pastor...

**On Open Communion As we continue in year three of our National Eucharistic Revival and move forward with the Synod initiated by Pope Francis several years ago, I want to talk more about the issue of Open Communion. Issues around Open Communion have been raised by the Revival and the Synod with summaries of the synod feedback including requests for the Church to be more inclusive with Holy Communion.

Two years ago I discussed in the bulletin and at Masses the issue of Catholic politicians receiving Holy Communion and the different pastoral approaches of our Church leaders. Pope Francis and Cardinal Gregory of Washington, DC choosing to not deny Holy Communion to President Biden due to his pro-abortion stance, saying it is an internal forum issue between pastor and individual, whereas Archbishop Cordileone from San Francisco has publicly banned Representative Nancy Pelosi from Holy Communion until she reconciles with the Church and publicly changes her pro-abortion stance. I will repeat part of that discussion here to reinforce that if we are to consider changing our approach to Holy Communion and open it to more people who do not agree with the Catholic moral, doctrinal, and hierarchical expression or to those who are not living in accord with what we believe as Catholics (for example, those who are divorced and actively in another relationship without an annulment or those who are actively in same sex relationships or marriages) then we have to change our theology of Holy Communion.

The Theology is this... the Eucharist is not just the source of grace, strength and unity in the church but also the most substantial expression of that unity of creed, moral code, hierarchy and liturgy. The church has always held that if you are making grave choices in your life that are in direct contrast with that creed, moral code, hierarchy and liturgy, and you are unrepentant, then you are breaking communion with the church and the Mystical Body of Christ. If that is the case, it is a contradiction to receive Holy Communion and so not receiving Holy Communion is not a punishment but rather a consequence.

of your choice to break communion with the church (to the best of the church's ability to know such things).

If we are to consider more "Open" Communion, then we can no longer say the reception of Holy Communion at Mass is an expression of the unity of the Mystical Body of Christ and this would be a major shift in Catholic Theology and frankly not possible in my understanding. I heard someone recently say as an argument for more open communion that Jesus multiplied the loaves and fishes for thousands who were not united with him. And that is accurate, Jesus did. But the feeding of the 5000 was not the first Mass or Holy Communion, the Last Supper was... And thousands were not there but only those who believed in him (save one who left the table and prayer because he was not united with Jesus). Two years ago I mentioned my hope that we could have one of our parish "Church in Dialogue" Sessions about this issue and we have yet to do that. I have not forgotten and hope that can be done before the end of the Eucharistic Revival in June 2025. **Erie Rosary March I will be the guest homilist for the annual Rosary March which takes place on Sunday, October 13th at St. Peter Cathedral and the streets of downtown Erie at **2pm**. I encourage you to join me. You can join the walk along the streets or if unable to walk, you can remain at the Cathedral in prayer. I will preach at the prayer service which takes place in the Cathedral once the March has ended, around 3:00-3:15pm.

Remember that October is the Month of the Rosary and this is an excellent opportunity to pray this powerful prayer with Bishop Persico and many other members of the Catholic Church of Erie and to grow in our devotion to our patroness, Our Lady of Peace.

- **Eucharistic Revival Continues at OLP Our parish leadership is planning to take the next year to continue to our Eucharistic Renewal here at OLP. Three aspects of that effort include:
- (1.) A parish wide Eucharistic Consecration from October 22-November 24 using Matthew Kelly's 33 Days of Eucharistic Glory. (2.) A Eucharistic Miracle Exhibit during Advent. (3.) Catechesis on the Mass/Eucharist in the bulletin with inserts.
- **Our Annual Pet Blessing will take place on Sunday, October 6th at 1:00pm in the parking lot in front of the main entrance to the school. We hold the pet blessing on the Sunday closest to the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi (October 4th) who is the patron saint of animals and the environment.
- **Explanation of Moving the Picnic Mass to the Church We ended up moving our Picnic Mass on Saturday, September 7th into the church instead of having it outdoors as we have done for several years. That was due to a recent articulation of our Diocesan Policy which I share with you here. "Reminder on the Proper Place for the Celebration of the Eucharist: Canon 932: §1 The Eucharistic celebration is to be carried out in a sacred

Place unless in a particular case necessity requires otherwise; in such a case the celebration must be done in a decent place. In a sacred place: The proper location for the celebration of the Mass is a sacred place, which is a technical term in the law (cf. c. 1205). Sacred places include: • Churches (both parish and secondary, with or without mission status) • Oratories (e.g., seminary, university, and convent chapels) • Catholic cemeteries. When necessity requires: In responding to the spiritual needs of the faithful, the priests of the parish may also be requested to celebrate Masses in other places, such as nursing homes, correctional facilities, the location for the parish picnic, or other appropriate places. The location should be decent and there must always be at least an altar cloth (always white) and a corporal (cf. c. 932 §2). The canon requires necessity, not just pastoral advantage, to celebrate outside of a sacred place. Barring possible exceptions, celebrating Mass on the parish property outside of the church building (such as in the parking lot or on the church lawn), when the church building is available and ready at hand, would lack any sense of necessity. Mass in that case should be celebrated in the church."

We had chosen to have to Mass outside for the parish picnic to create a unique setting to set the picnic Mass apart from our regular weekly Masses, but I completely understand and agree with the diocesan policy and hope that we can all support the parish complying with this policy.
