

GOD'S LAWS

God's laws are not intended to burden or torment us. Instead they are guideposts that point us in the direction of good living. Accordingly, good living requires loving God and loving one another. We should not follow God's laws out of fear of what might happen if we don't, but rather view them as a foundation for building relationships and trust with one another and with God.

The *Shema* prayer of Orthodox Jews is based on the reading from Deuteronomy today, "Hear, O Israel." Every morning people recite the prayer as a profession of their love for God and pledge their obedience to God throughout the day. They pass on their love of God to their children, from one generation to the next.



From the Pastor's Desk...

National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated November 3-9, 2024, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promoting vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated life through prayer and education; and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.

I share with you the PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS written by Bishop Persico and encourage you to pray it in an intentional way this week.

"Lord God, creator of all things and source of all gifts and talents, your Son came to this world to fulfill His vocation as the Redeemer of all humanity. Grant the sons and daughters of the parishes of the Diocese of Erie a profound awareness of their own vocations. Through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, may they come to realize their distinct place in your divine plan. Give them the grace to recognize and the courage to pursue vocations as devoted priests, deacons and consecrated women and men to assist the Diocese of Erie in fulfilling her mission. With the intercession of Saint Patrick, our patron, who preached the Gospel in word and deed, we pray that they may find happiness and fulfillment in a life of service to others. **OLP Cursillo We are trying something new next year in collaboration with the Cursillo Retreat Movement in our Diocese. We are planning a parish focused Curillo Retreat where OLP members are the team and we hope to fill the retreat with you, the men of OLP. I will be one of the spiritual directors, along with Deacon Ralph, and Mike McLaughlin will be the lay leader. Here's a little more about Erie Cursillo from their website... "Cursillo (kur-SEE-vo) literally means "little course" and is an intense three-day spiritual retreat, the purpose of which is a deep personal encounter with Jesus Christ. Those who experience the Cursillo Movement know it is more than just three days of religious instruction. It is an effort to change the spiritual environment, to bring Jesus Christ into the world." **Election Day has arrived (Tuesday, November 5th) and it is important for all Catholics to be aware of the guidance that our Diocese and the United States Bishops have offered us in voting. The Diocese of Erie has provided resources that can be found at https://www.eriercd.org/election.html. Included there is a letter from Bishop Persico, which I encourage you to read first, a summary of the Presidential candidates' positions on major issues (copies are available in the vestibule), a link to Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship (which is the US Bishops Document on Catholics role in political life) and a link to the Pennsylvania Catholic Conference's PA Voter's Guide (which is limited due to a lack of candidates' responses). As part of the Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship link, there are several summaries of the key points to the document which are also available in the vestibule.

I would like to reinforce several of the Bishop's points in his letter... First- we must pray in preparation for our vote and for the election in general. Prayer is essential in any discernment to allow the Holy Spirit to inspire us to know and do God's will and we seek that will for our country as well. To reinforce the need to pray for this election, we are having a day of prayer for Election Day (Tuesday, November 5th from 7:30am (after the 7am Mass)-until 6pm. The small group discussion for week 3 of the Eucharistic Consecration Session will start at 6:30pm.

Second- we must be aware of what our church teaches us in regard to the issues of social justice and the public life of our country. It is essential to be informed of our Catholic principles as we consider our stances in these issues. I realize not everyone agrees on these principles; but we must at least know what they are and understand them. Some Catholics do not understand the fullness of these principles and make their decisions based on incomplete or inaccurate information. Make sure you are fully formed.

Third- vote! This is one of the most fundamental rights and responsibilities that we have as faithful citizens. So please make sure to act on your prayer and formation and vote.

Lastly, I would include a quote from one of the resources that for me is a great summary of how we as Catholics are called to weigh the different issues when no candidate embodies all our view. "The right to life implies and is linked to other human rights - to the basic goods that every human person needs to live and thrive. All the life issues are connected, for erosion of respect for the life of any individual or group in society necessarily diminishes respect for all life. The moral imperative to respond to the needs of our neighbors basic needs such as food, shelter, health care, education, and meaningful work - is universally binding on our consciences and may be legitimately fulfilled by a variety of means. Catholics must seek the best ways to respond to these needs... Above all, the common outcry, which is justly made on behalf of human rights - for example, the right to health, to home, to work, to family, to culture- is false and illusory if the right to life, the most basic and fundamental right and the condition for all other personal rights, is not defended with maximum determination." (Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, Nos. 25, 26, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, 2019)

Disposing of Religious Articles

WHEN RELIGIOUS articles deteriorate to a point when they can no longer be used effectively, they should be disposed of with dignity. Your parish may burn old palm branches to make ashes for Ash Wednesday. But the proper disposal of other religious articles is not so clear.

The *Code of Canon Law* says that sacred objects designated for divine worship by dedication or blessing are to be treated reverently. They are not to be employed for profane or inappropriate use (can. 1171). Regarding large buildings, the code says they lose their dedication or blessing if they have been destroyed in large part, or if they have been turned over permanently to profane use (can. 1212).

But the code does not directly answer a very practical question many Catholics have: "What do I do with a broken rosary, a tarnished medal, or a deteriorating statue?"

In the past, the Vatican has offered several different solutions. If possible, put the object to some other sacred use. If not, burn it, melt it, or bury it. Try to avoid letting the object enter secular or profane use.

If you have old religious articles at home, you may bury them in the ground. When you do, you might read a passage from the Bible such as Revelation 21:1–5, which speaks about the passing away of a former world and the coming of something new. Recall the occasions you have used these items. Pray the Lord's Prayer. Do it in a spirit of thankfulness for all that these objects have meant and out of respect for the sacred realities they have represented.



Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments - Child **Protection and Creating Safe Environments – Bullying** is defined as any unwanted aggressive behavior by another youth or group of youths that involves an observed or perceived power imbalance and is repeated multiple times or is highly likely to be repeated. 20% of youth ages 12-18 experience bullying. When adults respond quickly to bullying behavior, they send the message that bullying is not acceptable. There are ways parents can make a positive difference. Parents can educate themselves on the signs that a child is being bullied or is a bully. Parents should keep the lines of communication open with their child and model for their child how to treat others. 


