From the Pastor's Desk...

A blessed Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe! This is the last Sunday of our church year and another opportunity to proclaim to each other and the world that Jesus Christ is our King and the King of the Universe! Our Incense and chants at Mass are small but significant ways that we honor our Lord and King, Jesus Christ at Mass this weekend. The crown over the tabernacle in Our Lady of Peace Church is a reminder of this great title we give to Jesus who is always present to us at every Mass and remains substantially present in the tabernacle 24/7.

This is also the day that we complete our Parish Eucharistic Consecration at our evening prayer service tonight (Sunday, November 24th) at 6pm. I am very excited for this moment for our parish and the graces that God continues to desire to shower upon us as we have participated in this consecration over the past 33 days. And I want to encourage you to be part of the service this Sunday even if you have not done the consecration. As far as the service is concerned, I have miscommunicated the plan over the last few weeks; so I want to clarify the final plan.

- From **5:30-6pm** there will be **silent adoration** as the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed at the end of the 4:30pm Mass.
- At 6pm we will pray Solemn Evening Prayer that is part of the Liturgy of the Hours.
- At 6:30pm we will have some music and silence that will lead to our Prayer of Eucharistic Consecration and Benediction.
- Then at **7pm** or so we will have some time for **fellowship** and refreshments.

This prayer service is our **Evening of Renewal for liturgical ministers**, so it is my hope that all liturgical ministers will make every effort to be there even if you were not able to be a part of the consecration.

On a different Eucharistic note, we have begun to periodically include a section in the bulletin called "Our Catholic Faith" which explains parts of the Mass and other parts of our Catholic Tradition that involve liturgy and worship. We planned this as part of the ongoing Eucharistic Revival that is still happening in the National Catholic Church (this is the 3rd of three years); and as a follow up to the "The One Hour to Peace . . . from Mass to Mission" Formation we experienced as a parish last Fall (2023) which gave an overview of the Mass. So keep your eyes open for those sections over the next 8-10 months and let's keep diving deeper in Eucharistic Amazement here at OLP!

May God bless Our Lady of Peace Parish through our Eucharistic Consecration... and our thanksgiving week ahead! Fr. Rich

<u>OLP Cursillo... Strive for '25</u> We are trying something new next year as a parish in collaboration with the Cursillo Retreat Movement in our Diocese. We are attempting to have a parish focused Curillo Retreat where OLP parishioners are the team members and we try to have mostly OLP members make the retreat. So, on for February 21-23, 2025, we will have the OLP Men's Cursillo at Our Lady of Mercy Church in **Harborcreek. I will be one of the spiritual directors, along with Deacon Ralph, and Mike McLaughlin will be the lay leader. A Women's Cursillo is planned for March 21-23, 2025 also at Our Lady of Mercy Church with many OLP members as part of the team. Here's a little more about Erie Cursillo from their website... "Cursillo (kur-SEE-yo) literally means "little course" and is an intense three-day spiritual retreat, the purpose of which is a deep personal encounter with Jesus Christ. Those who experience the Cursillo Movement know it is more than just three days of religious instruction. It is an effort to change the spiritual environment, to bring Jesus Christ into the world." Sign up is easy, stop by the office or register online at www.eriecursillo.org. **Catholic Church Guidelines for Funerals and Burial As we continue through the month of November, I remind you that our Catholic Tradition encourages us to pray for our beloved dead and visit their places of rest at the cemeteries during this month. This is also a good chance to encourage all of you, no matter what age you are, to make your own arrangements for your funeral (at the funeral home AND the church) so that you can ensure that your funeral is done the way you want it to be. It is always a regrettable situation when one of our parishioners who made Mass a priority in their life does not end up with a funeral mass because those who are planning their funeral do not have that same prioritization. Selecting your Funeral Mass readings and music can also allow you to reinforce the message you want your loved ones to hear at the funeral. If you would like to work on that, please stop the parish office and we can get you the resources to help you with that. I also take this opportunity to review a few of the Catholic Church's expectations on funerals and burials in general that I often see misunderstood or not known.... ONE- It is permissible for Catholics to be cremated so long as it is not done in rejection of our belief in the resurrection of the body at the second coming of Jesus Christ. TWO- we are expected to bury our deceased loved ones in blessed ground (Catholic cemetery OR a grave in a public cemetery that is blessed at the Committal Service after the Funeral). It is not therefore acceptable to leave cremated remains in an urn in our homes or have them scattered somewhere outside of a cemetery. THREE- please always consult with your pastor or the priest who will be presiding over the Rite of Christian Burial with you BEFORE making any final plans or traveling arrangements. Some days and times may not work for the priest's or church's schedule and it can be difficult if people have already purchased flight tickets, etc (the flexibility of the family is appreciated). Please do not arrange the funeral date and time with the mentality that the funeral home will find me a priest. Fr. Nick and I want to pray with you and appreciate the opportunity to be a part of the conversation to find a time that works for everyone. FOUR- our Rite of Christian Burial includes 3 parts- first, the Vigil Service at the Funeral Home. The church encourages an opportunity for visitation, viewing and prayer at a funeral home or other site. This is because it allows for closure in seeing our loved one laid out as well as an opportunity for our family and friends to offer

their support. To skip this step is to short-change the grieving process and makes it more difficult for our friends and family to reach out to us. The second part of the Rite is the funeral Mass at the Church. There is no greater prayer that we can offer for our loved one than the Catholic Mass and so the best thing we can do for the soul of our loved one who has died (and for all of us who remain) is to celebrate a Funeral Mass. To choose to have a funeral service at the funeral home suggests a lack of understanding and appreciation for the significance of the Mass. Even if someone is not Catholic or has been a way from the church, it could still be appropriate to have a Mass so please investigate this with the priest involved before you make your own assumptions. The third part of the Rite is the Committal Service at the cemetery. This brings prayerful closure and helps us make a connection to their final place of rest. Even if the Committal is done at a later date (the body needed to be cremated or some other reason), it is still appropriate to ask a priest or deacon to lead you in that prayer (and Fr. Nick and I are happy to do that for and with you!).



Happy New Year!

Yes, happy new year to all Catholics - not in 5 weeks but now!

With the first Sunday of Advent, the Church begins its new year – a new liturgical year, that is. Just as the earth has its seasons through which it cycles year after year, so the Church has seasons through which it cycles following the birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension of Our Lord, year in and year out.

The liturgical year consists of a seasonal (also known as temporal) cycle and a sanctoral cycle, As Vatican II's document on the liturgy tells us, in the seasonal cycle, known as the Proper of Seasons, the Church once again lives the whole "mystery of Christ, from the incarnation and birth until the ascension, the day of Pentecost, and the expectation of blessed hope and of the coming of the Lord" (Sacrosanctum Concilium #102). In the sanctoral cycle, known as the Proper of Saints, the Church celebrates and holds up as examples the martyrs and saints already with Christ in Heaven, giving special place of honor to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of Our Lord. The liturgical year is made up of six seasons:

- Advent four weeks of preparation for the celebration of Jesus' birth · Christmas recalling the Nativity of Jesus Christ and his manifestation to the peoples of the world ·
- Lent a six-week period of penance in preparation for the celebration of the Easter Triduum ·
- Sacred Paschal Triduum the holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where the Christian people recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus ·
- Easter 50 days of joyful celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead and his sending forth of the Holy Spirit \cdot
- Ordinary Time divided into two sections (one span of 4-8 weeks after Christmas Time and another lasting about six months after Easter Time), wherein the faithful consider the fullness of Jesus' teachings and works among his people

The liturgical year is also reflected in the readings at Mass. The Sunday readings follow a three-year cycle, Year A, Year B and Year C. Year A uses readings from the Gospel of Matthew, Year B from the Gospel of Mark and Year C from the Gospel of Luke, with readings from the Gospel of John on certain Feast Days and for certain particular times, such as on Good Friday. The weekday readings follow a two-year cycle, years 1 and 2.

The mystery of Christ unfolds through the cycle of the liturgical year and calls us to live his mystery in our own lives. This call is best illustrated in the lives of Mary and the other saints, celebrated by the Church throughout the year. The celebration of the saints does not take away from the mystery of Christ, rather both form a marvelous harmony. The **Blessed Virgin Mary** is joined by an inseparable bond to the saving work of her Son, and the feasts of all the **saints** proclaim the wonderful works of Christ in his servants and offer the faithful fitting examples for their imitation.



First Week of Advent - December 1-7

What is Advent? The word Advent is from the Latin adventus for "coming" and is associated with the four weeks of preparation of our hearts for Christmas. It is a time for reflection, prayer and action.

Get out your Advent Wreath ahead this year and make it part of your preparations for Christmas to pray daily. Our waiting has begun. As we light the first candle, it creates a dim light against a world that often seems foreboding and dark. Why do we light a candle? We light it because we are a people of hope.

Lord, our God, we praise You for Your Son, Jesus Christ, for He is Emmanuel, the Hope of all people. He is the Wisdom that teaches and guides us. He is the Savior of us all. O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light the first (purple) candle of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation. May He come quickly and not delay. We ask this in His holy name. Amen.

Actions for the first week of Advent:

Perform an act of kindness for someone you do not know. Send a card to a friend or loved one who has lost a family member during this year and let them know you are praying for them and thinking of them. Make a gift of your time or money to a charitable organization that helps the poor. Find an opportunity to be the hands of God. Say a kind word and listen with compassion to someone who is suffering.

Second Week

Advent is the "trifecta" of celebrations: (1) Celebrating the birth of Christ. (2) Waiting for Christ's return to Earth again. (3) Waiting for Christ to come into our hearts. In a culture where we are so used to instant gratification, we have most certainly lost the art of waiting. We've lost the wonder and contemplation needed to appreciate the beauty and mystery of Advent. How can we find Christ at Christmas if we aren't watching and waiting for Him.

Advent gives us a chance to really commit our minds where it matters most, on the next life. How do I do that?

Quit being "too busy" to be faithful. It's a busy time, we get it. You have to do the thing with the thing before the thing and then you have to rush off to another thing, and there's just not enough time in the day. If you wait for the time, it'll never come. So make room in your life, in your heart. Turn off your phone. Set aside the to-do list. Light a candle. Say a prayer. Sit in the chapel with Jesus. Use your advent wreath each day.

Lord, our God, we praise You for Your Son, Jesus Christ, for He is Emmanuel, the Hope of all people. He is the Wisdom that teaches and guides us. He is the Savior of us all.

O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light two (purple) candles of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation. May He come quickly and not delay.

We ask this in His holy name. Amen.

Actions for the Second Week of Advent:

Send a get-well card for someone in the hospital.

Send a Christmas card to a young person you know. Remind them that you are praying for them, and remind them of the faith significance of the upcoming holiday.

Let God's mercy and love operate in your own life. Make up with a friend or family member you have been fighting with.

Renew your commitment to a special time of Advent prayer each day throughout the season. Say a prayer sometime today for our country. Learn about Our Lady of Guadalupe and St. Juan Diego.

Pray for St. Lucy's intercession that we not be blinded by our personal goals, but always seek what God wants us to do.



Third Week

December 15 - 21

The third Sunday of Advent is known as Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" and reminds us to Rejoice in the Lord always. It expresses our joy and anticipation of the birth of Christ. Pope Francis reminds us that "We must be awake, alert, vigilant. Jesus warns us: there is the danger of not realizing His coming and being unprepared for His visit. I have recalled on other occasions what Saint Augustine said: 'I fear the Lord who passes by'...that is, I fear that He will pass by and I will not recognize Him!" Advent is the time we can be shaken out of our lethargy and awakened "from our slumber" to be vigilant always. God conceals Himself in the most ordinary of situations. We should not be waiting for extraordinary events. Make time to look for God's presence in daily situations. He reminds us that if we are unaware of this reality today, we will be unprepared when He arrives at the end of time.

This week you are challenged to sacrifice all those things that keep you "too busy." Then, substitute them with Jesus. Give up some part of your daily routine to fit in 20-30 minutes just for Jesus.

- Pray on your afternoon walk or run.
- Dedicate a decade of the Rosary to someone you don't know who needs prayer.
- Listen to Scripture or a faith-based book/podcast on your work commute.
- Grab your bible and pick out a psalm. Choose a sentence and make it your daily meditation.
- Use your Advent Wreath as part of your daily prayer and rejoice!



Lord, our God, we praise You for Your Son, Jesus Christ, for He is Emmanuel, the Hope of all people. He is the Wisdom that teaches and guides us. He is the Savior of us all.

O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light two (purple) candles and the third (pink) candle of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation. May He come quickly and not delay.

We ask this in His holy name. Amen.

Actions for the Third Week of Advent:

Make something (bake a cake, draw a picture) to cheer someone up or as a means of sharing the spirit of the season.

Examine your conscience. Are you continually turning towards God?

Give one of your possessions away to the poor or donate to a charity.

Put up your creche (nativity set) or some other symbol to remind you of the coming feast.

Write a letter or send a card telling someone how much you care for them and how much they are loved by God.

Fourth Week

What does it mean to "wait well?" First we need to know what it is we are waiting for. Are you "waiting" for Jesus to come into the world? Are you waiting for, longing for Jesus to come into certain areas of your life, your world and your heart? That is what we are waiting for in Advent. So, this week ask yourself where do you want Jesus to enter into your life? Where are you, deep down in your heart, hoping for Him to come into your life?

Ven. Fulton Sheen says "There are two births of Christ, one unto the world in Bethlehem; the other in the soul, when it is spiritually reborn." "It was the second birth that Saint Paul insisted on when he wrote from prison asking that Christ may dwell in their hearts by faith and that they be rooted and grounded in love. This is the second Bethlehem, or the personal relationship of the individual heart to the Lord Christ."

Give, give, give...

You don't always have to give money. Give your time, talent, and friendship. Be kind to someone who is difficult. Pay someone a compliment who doesn't deserve it. Hold open a door for a stranger. Offer to help someone carry their groceries. Write an inspirational quote on cards and randomly place them on car windshields or neighbors doors. Remember that the smallest act of kindness is still a huge act of love.

Get to Confession. If we believe Advent is the time to celebrate the Second Coming, we should be ready at all times. No one wants to greet Jesus with a dirty soul.

Let's finish Advent humbled and filled with everlasting love for each other so we can show the world what true Christianity is all about. Let's find the peace by allowing Christ to enter our hearts so that one day we can kneel in reverence, bow our heads and know that we have served our purpose in this life: serving and loving.






