Family Discussion of the Week: False Pride

Jesus straightened up and said, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." (Jn. 8:7)

Adults: Have you ever been too willing to "cast the first stone" when you disapproved of someone's behavior? How can you resist these feelings?

Kids: When have you made fun of someone? What could help you act differently?

GOD'S ACTIONS NOW

When Jews celebrate the Passover, they always tell the story of the Exodus in present terms, as if they themselves experienced those events: when we were prisoners in Egypt; when God brought us out of slavery and through the waters of the sea. We would do well to follow their example and see the works of Jesus and his sacrifice as being in the present, as happening to us now. We believe that Christ's work, his teachings, and his sacrifice on the cross were not just for his followers in the past, but for all people at all times. When we think of this in our prayers, we become one in faith with that great cloud of witnesses, the saints.

We have been striving through Lent to repent of our sins and failings, and to follow Jesus more closely. Today in the story of the woman caught in adultery, we see Jesus forgiving the woman, saving her from a horrible death, and urging her not to sin any more. This is new, and brings out something for which the law had not allowed-forgiveness. Of course one can sin no more if one is dead, caught in one's sins forever. Serra Prayer for Vocations

From the Pastor's Desk...

Blessed 5th Sunday of Lent! This Sunday was traditionally called Passiontide, and we continue the practice of covering the statues to take our liturgical fast of Lent even further. I continue the deeper look at the Sacred Triduum that I started last week in hope that it will encourage more of you to partake in these most holy days of the whole church year. Last weekend I focused on an introduction to the concept of the Sacred Triduum and a summary of Holy Thursday. **This weekend** I focus on Good Friday and Holy Saturday (next weekend will be the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday).

GOOD FRIDAY (April 18th)- Good Friday is a mandatory day of fasting and abstinence. This is the day of the crucifixion, the day Jesus died for the sins of the world. The parish altar looks very different on Good Friday: it is plain and bare. There is no consecrated Host in the tabernacle at the main altar of the church; it was carried away on Holy Thursday night to the "altar of repose" to signify Jesus' death. The candle by the tabernacle is blown out, and the tabernacle doors are left open to show that it is empty. Jesus is gone. This is quite dramatic, reminding us that Good Friday is a solemn day of mourning and prayer.

The ceremony on Good Friday is not a Mass—it is a communion service using the consecrated hosts from Holy Thursday. Good Friday is the only day of the year on which no Masses are offered. These Good Friday services often take place at the time Jesus died (3pm) or during the time he hung on the cross (12-3pm).

At OLP, our service begins at 1:30pm and it usually concludes around 2:45-3pm. The priests and deacon begin the service by prostrating themselves in front of the altar. A liturgy of the Word that includes the reading of John's version of the Passion begins the service. It continues with an extended Prayer of the Faithful where we pray for the church and world. Veneration of the Cross is next at this service, in which the priest and the faithful kneel before a cross and possibly kiss it or show some sign of reverence. It concludes with the distribution of Holy Communion and then concludes in silence as an invitation to continue to meditate on the truth that this day represents.

At OLP, we have morning prayer at 8:00am on Good Friday as well as a Tenebrae Service at 7pm. It is a meditation on the passion and death of Jesus as well using the imagery of light and darkness.

HOLY SATURDAY (April 19th)- On this day Christ is in the tomb. There is no daytime Mass on Holy Saturday. It is still a day of fasting and sorrow before the Easter Vigil begins that evening. We recall, with Mary and the disciples, that Jesus died and was separated from them for the first time as He lay in the tomb. The faithful are expected to continue their Good Friday fast through Holy Saturday. In the Apostles Creed we pray "He descended into hell" (translated hades, that is, the temporary abode of the dead—not the eternal lake of fire) which describes what Jesus did in the time between his burial and Resurrection. Jesus descended to the realm of the dead on Holy Saturday to save the righteous souls—the Old Testament patriarchs, for example—who died before his crucifixion.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church calls Jesus' descent into the realm of the dead "the last phase of Jesus'

messianic mission," during which he "opened heaven's gates for the just who had gone before him." Before Holy Saturday, there were no souls enjoying the beatific vision of God in heaven! Christ's work on Holy Saturday is also known as the "Harrowing of Hell."

At OLP, we have Morning Prayer at 8am on this day as well as the traditional blessing of the Easter Foods at Noon.

May God bless our 5th Week of Lent ahead!

**Jubilee Weekend for the Sick/World Health/Disability AND Anointing of the Sick Mass Our next Jubilee Mass Weekend at OLP is: April 5/6 for the Sick/World Health (April 5-6)/Disability (April 28-29)- we will have the Sacrament of ANOINTING of the Sick at the 5PM Mass on April 5th Mass. **Walking with the American Saints This Tuesday, April 8th from 7-8pm is the last session and I will present on St. Katharine Drexel who is from our very own state of Pennsylvania and who's shrine I visited during Pope Francis' first papal visit to the United States in 2015 for the World Gathering of Families. Since then, St. Katharine's tomb was moved to the Cathedral in Philadelphia.

**"<u>The Light is On for You</u>" is THIS Wednesday, April 9th from 5-7pm (local churches are open and priests hearing confessions throughout Erie). See page 7 for participating churches.

**<u>Stations of the Cross</u> are held every Friday of Lent (April 11) at 7pm. Confessions are heard from 6-7pm every night of the Stations.

**Lenten Confessions In addition to our normal weekly confession times (Wednesdays from 11:15am-Noon, Saturdays from 8:30-9am and 3:45-4:45pm) we have extra opportunities throughout Lent. They are Fridays from 6-7pm (before Stations) and after all Sunday Masses including 4:30pm. "The Light is On for You" is Wednesday, April 9th from 5-7pm.

**<u>The Chrism Mass</u>, which is Monday, April I 4th at Ipm at St. Peter Cathedral, is one of the greatest celebrations and expressions of the community of our Diocesan Church of the entire church year. The oils are blessed by Bishop Persico that will be used for the sacraments at parishes for the next year and the priests of the diocese recommit ourselves to our priestly ministry. This is another liturgy that every Catholic should experience at least once. This is a great opportunity to show solidarity with our Bishop and your priests- we would love to pray with you there!

<u>24 Hour Adoration During Holy Week at OLP</u> will be held from Tuesday, April 15th at 12:30pm to Noon on Wednesday, April 17th. Please consider signing up for a 30 or 60 minute slot in the vestibule. ****<u>Masses this Week</u> la Salle, Priest (18^{th} century French patron of teachers); *Tuesday*, *April* 8^{th} to *Thursday*, *April* 10^{th} - Lenten Weekdays; *Friday*, *April* 11^{th} - St. Stanislaus, Bishop and Martyr (11^{th} Century Bishop of Cracow); *Saturday*, *April* 12^{th} - Lenten Weekday.

****Catholic Services Appeal 2025** We presently have 330 Pledges for \$177,622. Thank you to all who have pledged! We have exceeded our assessment to the Diocese of Erie (\$151,000) but our goal is 400 pledges for \$227,000 and our parish project is the renovation of the rectory kitchen as well as the replacing of the flooring for the first floor. Please consider making a pledge; envelopes are at the doors of the church or at the parish office.

**Mass Intentions/Mass Schedule at OLP On April 2nd we opened the Mass Intention Book for the rest of 2025. Until now, the book was only open through June of 2025 because there was talk of a collective effort by the Diocese to evaluate the Mass schedule for all churches in and around Erie. After further consideration, the Bishop and Diocesan leadership have decided not to initiate that and are leaving it up to individual parishes to consider the need to adjust their Mass schedules. I can tell you that I have tasked our leadership at OLP to look at our schedule and consider if we need to make changes. Looking at the October Count for the Diocese of Erie (all parishes are asked to get a count on the number of people attending each weekend Mass throughout October each year), although OLP had the highest weekly average in 2024 of 1,140 people per weekend (with the next closest being St. James- 865, St. Jude-768, St. George-767, Blessed Sacrament-753, St. Patrick at 750 and St. Peter-598), that is only 1/3 of the weekly attendance we had in 2005 when we had 6 Masses each weekend. Our church can hold approximately 800-900 people so with 5 Masses we could handle 4000-4500 per weekend; so we are at about 25% capacity overall. So let's pray that the Holy Spirit guide this process that we are beginning and inspire what is best for our parish and diocese regarding our Mass schedule at OLP. **HOLY THURSDAY, APRIL 17th- The evening Mass on Holy Thursday (at 7pm at OLP) is referred to as The Mass of the Lord's Supper. This is where the Church re-lives the institution of the Eucharist and the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass at the Last Supper, as well as the institution of the priesthood, which took place the evening before Jesus was crucified. After the homily there is an optional "washing of the feet" ceremony, where the priest washes the feet of others to signify his role as servantjust as Jesus did with his disciples. Extra hosts are consecrated at this Mass to be used on Good Friday when no Mass will be celebrated. The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the "altar of repose," a place where the consecrated Host is kept, away from the main altar where Mass is normally celebrated. (at OLP it is in the school cafeteria). Many parishes create space for people to stay and pray with the reposed Eucharist at this altar of repose late into the night, remembering Jesus' request in the Garden of Gethsemane for someone to "watch and pray" with Him. (at OLP we do this from 8:15-11pm at which time we pray Night Prayer (Liturgy of the Hours) and then public prayer ends). At OLP, we start Holy Thursday with morning prayer at 8:00am.

****Faithful to the Finish 5K** Our 11th Annual 5K will be held on Saturday, May 10th at 8am at Presque Isle. Remember that all funds raised by our 5K go towards building up our Parish Endowment which we started several years ago with the Catholic Foundation of NWPa. As we prepare to celebrate the 70th Anniversary of the OLP in September, your support of the 5K will ensure the ministry of Our Lady of Peace for years to come! Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments - Child Abuse Prevention Month - Reporting Child Abuse: It is every adult's moral responsibility to report known or suspected abuse or neglect of a minor to the responsible authorities. Physical and sexual abuse of minors are pervasive societal problems, and only concerted and sustained efforts by all adults in every segment of society can help to protect children and youth. In the 2023 Pennsylvania statewide report there were 5,129 substantiated reports of child abuse. 1,749 or 34.1% of the substantiated reported were for sexual abuse, 1,350 were physical abuse. Parents remain the persons most responsible for abuse of their children. To report child abuse, call Childline at 1-800-932-0323 (anytime 24/7). 
