

The soldiers also mocked him, ...saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." (Luke 23:36-38) *Adults:* In what ways is Jesus the ruler of your life?

Kids: How can you show that you honor Jesus as the King of your life?

OF KINGS AND KINGSHIP

Americans have an uncomfortable relationship with kings. The American Revolution was fought for independence from King George, after all. Nonetheless, today every Catholic church around the world celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Today's feast invites us to look beyond our national loyalties and rejoice in our primary identity. We are children of God in Jesus, Christ the King. Our readings help us consider what it's like to belong to God's kingdom. The book of Samuel captures the deep longing of the Israelites for a king to shepherd them. Saint Paul reminds the Colossians that we belong to the kingdom of Christ, whose power he praises in a beautiful hymn. Finally, Luke's Gospel calls to mind the kind of king Jesus chooses to be—a suffering servant, a man for others. By sacrificing his life for us, Jesus throws open the gates of Paradise.

From the Pastor's Desk...

A blessed Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe! This is the last Sunday of our church year and another opportunity to proclaim to each other and our world that Jesus Christ is our King and the King of the Universe! Our Incense and chants at Mass are small but significant ways that we honor our Lord and King, Jesus Christ at Mass this weekend. The crown over the tabernacle in the church is a reminder of this great title we give to Jesus who is always present to us at every Mass and remains substantially present in the tabernacle 24/7. Please see below for how you can join us in prayer on this special day.

As we look forward to starting a new liturgical year next weekend with the First Sunday in Advent, I wanted to inform you of an adjustment we will be making at Mass. But first some background... when COVID hit in 2020, we started saying the Spiritual Communion Prayer before or after the Communion Procession for those who were attending Mass via livestream through the Our Lady of Peace YouTube Channel. This was a way to help them ask for grace at the moment of Holy Communion online even if they could not receive Holy Communion and be there in person. We have continued that practice for the past 5 years as we have livestreamed our 9am Mass for those who may have still been weary of returning to Mass or unable to do so.

We have learned that technically the Spiritual Communion Prayer is not part of the Rite of the Catholic Mass, the parish staff and liturgy committee feel it is a good time to stop saying the this prayer verbally at the livestream Mass and to encourage our online participants to say the prayer on their own. For the first few weeks we will prompt the livestream congregation to say the prayer on their own and after that no mention of the spiritual communion prayer will be made at Mass. We will include the prayer in description on our YouTube livestream for Masses. Below is the Spiritual Communion Prayer we have been using:

"My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul.

Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as if you were already there, and I unite myself wholly to You.

Never permit me to be separated from You.

Amen." (Saint Alphonsus Liguori)

On a related note, I want to clarify that if you are physically able to be at Mass in person, that watching/praying the Mass online is not a valid way to attend Mass each week. I am surprised to still hear people say that they are being told by others that attending Mass online fulfills the "first Catholic precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation.") that requires the faithful to participate in the Eucharistic celebration when the Christian community gathers together on the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord." (taken from paragraph 2042 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church). One of the ways God brought good from the

cross of COVID was to motivate parishes like OLP to figure out how to provide online Mass for those who are homebound. It was not to allow those who could physically be at Mass a way to fulfill the obligation by staying at home on their own free will. If you miss Mass on the weekend, it is good for you to watch the Mass online to still be connected with us and to hear the message but you should still get to confession and commit to being at Mass physically the next week.

**Sunday, Nov. 16, 2025, was the World Day of the Poor, a day established by Pope Francis in 2017 for Catholics to "reflect on how poverty is at the very heart of the Gospel." The theme for 2025 is You are my hope (Ps 71:5). "Amid life's trials, our hope is inspired by the firm and reassuring certainty of God's love, poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit," wrote Pope Leo XIV in his message for the day. "The living God is in fact 'the God of hope' (Rom 15:13), and Christ, by his death and resurrection, has himself become 'our hope." (1 Tim 1:1). Pope Leo said that the poor "can be witnesses to a strong and steadfast hope, precisely because they embody it in the midst of uncertainty, poverty, instability, and marginalization," not being able to "rely on the security of power and possessions." Pope Leo also reminded us that "the gravest form of poverty is not to know God."

After the Year of Mercy in 2016, Pope Francis said he wanted to set aside a day so that, throughout the world, Christian communities could become even greater signs of Christ's charity for those in need. We are called, Pope Francis wrote in his first World Day of the Poor message, "to draw near to the poor, to encounter them, to meet their gaze, to embrace them, and to let them feel the warmth of love that breaks through their solitude. Their outstretched hand is also an invitation to step out of our certainties and comforts, and to acknowledge the value of poverty in itself." The pope said that for Christ's disciples, "poverty is, above all, a call to follow Jesus in his own poverty," and he asked Catholics to take as their example St. Francis of Assisi, who kept his gaze fixed on Christ, allowing him to see and serve the poor.

I take this day focused on the poor to remind you of the ways we serve the poor in this season of Fall and Winter:

- 1. "Coats for Kids" drive hosted by Inter-Church Ministries in October.
- 2. Collection of desserts for the West Millcreek Food Pantry Thanksgiving Dinners through November 23rd.
- 3. Collection of non-perishable food items at all Masses, November 24th through November 30th (including Thanksgiving Mass on Thursday, November 27th) for the West Millcreek Food Pantry.
- 4. Advents Service Project: Donations of Gift Cards for the Shining Star Project for St. Martin Center Christmas Gift Distribution now until December 8th.
- 5. Advent Service Project: Donations of toiletries and cleaning supplies for the West Millcreek Food Pantry families, now through December 14th. The items are packed at our Advent Community Gathering on Tuesday, December 16th.
- 6. Opportunities to volunteer at Emmaus Soup Kitchen and Erie City Mission as part of our regular OLP monthly commitments.
- 7. Volunteer for the Our Neighbors Place Overflow Shelter for OLP's week of service, January 14-20, 2026 (there will be a signup weekend of December 20-21).
- 8. Keep an eye on the parish bulletin and weekly email for other opportunities to serve the poor of our community.

I thank the OLP Outreach Committee led by JoAnn Barnes and our Parish Outreach Coordinator, Andy Heinlein, for all they do to help organize and execute these efforts. I have said it before and I will say it again; I believe one significant way the Catholic Church is going to reclaim credibility in our society after the challenges we have faced is a renewed commitment to serving the poor and needy in our community. So let's all be part of that renewed commitment by doing our part in serving those most in need in our community!





Happy New Year!

Yes, happy new year to all Catholics - not in 5 weeks but now!

With the first Sunday of Advent, the Church begins its new year – a new liturgical year, that is. Just as the earth has its seasons through which it cycles year after year, so the Church has seasons through which it cycles following the birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension of Our Lord, year in and year out.

The liturgical year consists of a seasonal (also known as temporal) cycle and a sanctoral cycle, As Vatican II's document on the liturgy tells us, in the seasonal cycle, known as the Proper of Seasons, the Church once again lives the whole "mystery of Christ, from the incarnation and birth until the ascension, the day of Pentecost, and the expectation of blessed hope and of the coming of the Lord" (Sacrosanctum Concilium #102). In the sanctoral cycle, known as the Proper of Saints, the Church celebrates and holds up as examples the martyrs and saints already with Christ in Heaven, giving special place of honor to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of Our Lord. The liturgical year is made up of six seasons:

- Advent four weeks of preparation for the celebration of Jesus' birth · Christmas recalling the Nativity of Jesus Christ and his manifestation to the peoples of the world ·
- Lent a six-week period of penance in preparation for the celebration of the Easter Triduum ·
- Sacred Paschal Triduum the holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where the Christian people recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus ·
- Easter 50 days of joyful celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead and his sending forth of the Holy Spirit ·
- Ordinary Time divided into two sections (one span of 4-8 weeks after Christmas Time and another lasting about six months after Easter Time), wherein the faithful consider the fullness of Jesus' teachings and works among his people

The liturgical year is also reflected in the readings at Mass. The Sunday readings follow a three-year cycle, Year A, Year B and Year C. Year A uses readings from the Gospel of Matthew, Year B from the Gospel of Mark and Year C from the Gospel of Luke, with readings from the Gospel of John on certain Feast Days and for certain particular times, such as on Good Friday. The weekday readings follow a two-year cycle, years 1 and 2.

The mystery of Christ unfolds through the cycle of the liturgical year and calls us to live his mystery in our own lives. This call is best illustrated in the lives of Mary and the other saints, celebrated by the Church throughout the year. The celebration of the saints does not take away from the mystery of Christ, rather both form a marvelous harmony. The **Blessed Virgin Mary** is joined by an inseparable bond to the saving work of her Son, and the feasts of all the **saints** proclaim the wonderful works of Christ in his servants and offer the faithful fitting examples for their imitation .

Advent 2025

First Week of Advent - November 30-December 6

What is Advent? The word Advent is from the Latin adventus for "coming" and is associated with the four weeks of preparation of our hearts for Christmas. It is a time for reflection, prayer and action.

Get out your Advent Wreath ahead this year and make it part of your preparations for Christmas to pray daily. Our waiting has begun. As we light the first candle, it creates a dim light against a world that often seems foreboding and dark. Why do we light a candle? We light it because we are a people of hope.

Lord, our God, we praise You for Your Son, Jesus Christ, for He is Emmanuel, the Hope of all people. He is the Wisdom that teaches and guides us. He is the Savior of us all. O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light the first (purple) candle of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation. May He come quickly and not delay. We ask this in His holy name. Amen.

Actions for the first week of Advent:

Perform an act of kindness for someone you do not know.

Send a card to a friend or loved one who has lost a family member during this year and let them know you are praying for them and thinking of them.

Make a gift of your time or money to a charitable organization that helps the poor. Find an opportunity to be the hands of God. Say a kind word and listen with compassion to someone who is suffering.

Second Week

Advent is the "trifecta" of celebrations: (1) Celebrating the birth of Christ.

(2) Waiting for Christ's return to Earth again. (3) Waiting for Christ to come into our hearts. In a culture where we are so used to instant gratification, we have most certainly lost the art of waiting. We've lost the wonder and contemplation needed to appreciate the beauty and mystery of Advent. How can we find Christ at Christmas if we aren't watching and waiting for Him.

Advent gives us a chance to really commit our minds where it matters most, on the next life. How do I do that?

Quit being "too busy" to be faithful. It's a busy time, we get it. You have to do the thing with the thing before the thing and then you have to rush off to another thing, and there's just not enough time in the day. If you wait for the time, it'll never come. So make room in your life, in your heart. Turn off your phone. Set aside the to-do list. Light a candle. Say a prayer. Sit in the chapel with Jesus. Use your advent wreath each day.

Lord, our God, we praise You for Your Son, Jesus Christ, for He is Emmanuel, the Hope of all people. He is the Wisdom that teaches and guides us. He is the Savior of us all.

O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light two (purple) candles of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation. May He come quickly and not delay.

We ask this in His holy name. Amen.



Actions for the Second Week of Advent:

Send a get-well card for someone in the hospital.

Send a Christmas card to a young person you know. Remind them that you are praying for them, and remind them of the faith significance of the upcoming holiday.

Let God's mercy and love operate in your own life. Make up with a friend or family member you have been fighting with.

Renew your commitment to a special time of Advent prayer each day throughout the season. Say a prayer sometime today for our country. Learn about Our Lady of Guadalupe and St. Juan Diego. Pray for St. Lucy's intercession that we not be blinded by our personal goals, but always seek what God wants us to do.

Third Week

December 14 - 20

The third Sunday of Advent is known as Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" and reminds us to Rejoice in the Lord always. It expresses our joy and anticipation of the birth of Christ.

Pope Francis reminds us that "We must be awake, alert, vigilant. Jesus warns us: there is the danger of not realizing His coming and being unprepared for His visit. I have recalled on other occasions what Saint Augustine said: 'I fear the Lord who passes by'...that is, I fear that He will pass by and I will not recognize Him!" Advent is the time we can be shaken out of our lethargy and awakened "from our slumber" to be vigilant always. God conceals Himself in the most ordinary of situations. We should not be waiting for extraordinary events. Make time to look for God's presence in daily situations. He reminds us that if we are unaware of this reality today, we will be unprepared when He arrives at the end of time.

This week you are challenged to sacrifice all those things that keep you "too busy." Then, substitute them with Jesus. Give up some part of your daily routine to fit in 20-30 minutes just for Jesus.

- Pray on your afternoon walk or run.
- Dedicate a decade of the Rosary to someone you don't know who needs prayer.
- Listen to Scripture or a faith-based book/podcast on your work commute.
- Grab your bible and pick out a psalm. Choose a sentence and make it your daily meditation.
- Use your Advent Wreath as part of your daily prayer and rejoice!

O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light two (purple) candles and the third (pink) candle of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation. May He come quickly and not delay.

We ask this in His holy name. Amen.

Actions for the Third Week of Advent:

Make something (bake a cake, draw a picture) to cheer someone up or as a means of sharing the spirit of the season.

Examine your conscience. Are you continually turning towards God?

Give one of your possessions away to the poor or donate to a charity.

Put up your creche (nativity set) or some other symbol to remind you of the coming feast.

Write a letter or send a card telling someone how much you care for them and how much they are loved by God.

Fourth Week

What does it mean to "wait well?" First we need to know what it is we are waiting for. Are you "waiting" for Jesus to come into the world? Are you waiting for, longing for Jesus to come into certain areas of your life, your world and your heart? That is what we are waiting for in Advent. So, this week ask yourself where do you want Jesus to enter into your life? Where are you, deep down in your heart, hoping for Him to come into your life?

Ven. Fulton Sheen says "There are two births of Christ, one unto the world in Bethlehem; the other in the soul, when it is spiritually reborn." "It was the second birth that Saint Paul insisted on when he wrote from prison asking that Christ may dwell in their hearts by faith and that they be rooted and grounded in love. This is the second Bethlehem, or the personal relationship of the individual heart to the Lord Christ."

Give, give, give...

You don't always have to give money. Give your time, talent, and friendship. Be kind to someone who is difficult. Pay someone a compliment who doesn't deserve it. Hold open a door for a stranger. Offer to help someone carry their groceries. Write an inspirational quote on cards and randomly place them on car windshields or neighbors doors. Remember that the smallest act of kindness is still a huge act of love.

Get to Confession. If we believe Advent is the time to celebrate the Second Coming, we should be ready at all times. No one wants to greet Jesus with a dirty soul.

Let's finish Advent humbled and filled with everlasting love for each other so we can show the world what true Christianity is all about. Let's find the peace by allowing Christ to enter our hearts so that one day we can kneel in reverence, bow our heads and know that we have served our purpose in this life: serving and loving.

Lord, our God, we praise You for Your Son, Jesus Christ, for He is Emmanuel, the Hope of all people.

He is the Wisdom that teaches and guides us. He is the Savior of us all.

O Lord, let your blessing come upon us as we light all candles of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise of salvation.

May He come quickly and not delay. We ask this in His holy name. Amen.

Action for the Fourth Week of Advent:

Look around you for a sign of God's presence. When you find it, share it with someone. Gather your family and read the story of the birth of Christ, Luke 2:1-20.

Let Jesus reign in your heart and let love be born anew, like that little Babe on that first Christmas morning 2,000 years ago.


